Two young men begin business by investing \$1,000. John invests in a \$4,000 farm, pays \$1,000 and gives a mortgage for \$3,000 to Uncle Reubeu, a wealthy money

\$3,000 to Uncle Reuben, a wealthy money loaner. John then owns only one quarter of the farm, but pays the whole tax, while wealthy Uncle Reuben escapes.

All of these classes, as well as Uncle Reuben, enjoy good roads, sate bridges and free schools (free to them but not to John, who must supply these for himself and all the others).
