THE MARKETS

THE LOCAL MARKET.

London, Thursday, Aug. 14.

Wheat, white, per bu. 44½ to 45½
Oats, per bu. 35 to 36

There was a small attendance at the market this morning. The farmers are busy harvesting their crops. Vegetables comprised the bulk of the offerings.

Grain—Ten loads of oats sold higher, at \$1.10 to \$1.15 per cwt.

Hay and straw—Six loads of hay sold readily at \$1.10 to \$1.15 per ton. The demand is good. Straw is scarce, at \$1.10 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—There was a keen demand for the butter offered, which brought the following prices: Creamery, 15c to 16c; pound rolls, 15c to 16c; creamery, 15c to 16c; whole sale, Eggs were firm, at 14c to 15c for basket lots, and 16c by the single dozen.

Potatoes were unchanged in price, at 8c per bu. or 10c per bag. One load of 20-bushel baskets, the crop promises to be short. Green corn is more plentiful, at 10c to 12c per dozen. Cucumbers sold at 20c to 25c per dozen. Beans slow, at 20c per peck. Cauliflower, 10c to 15c each.

Honey—Scarce, at the 10c per lb for strained and 15c per lb for that in the comb.

Fruit—Apples were in almost every vehicle on the market; sales were good, considering the large quantity offered, mostly at 20c to 40c per bu. A few choice barrels sold at \$1 each. Thimbleberries sold at 8c per bu; peaches, 20c; plums, 20c to 25c; pears, 20c to 25c; berries, 20c to 25c.

Poultry—The supply was fair, at the following prices: Spring chickens, 50c to 60c per pair; dressed and 40c to 50c per pair; ducks, dressed, 70c to 80c; live do, 60c to 70c per pair.

Meats—The supply was light; prices are unchanged.

Dressed Hogs—Only a few offered, selling at \$2.25 per cwt.

A BRILLIANT SPECTACLE!

Troops From India Reviewed by His Majesty.

KING WORE A \$50,000 SWORD

The Handsome Gift Made by a Maharajah—Great Ovation to Queen Alexandra.

London, Aug. 14.—The Indian coronation troops to the number of 1,300 were reviewed by King Edward at Buckingham Palace yesterday. The arrangements were similar to those of the previous day, when a body of colonials was reviewed. The Prince of Wales presented medals to the men, who are all picked troops, including Lord Curzon's body guard. They presented a fine spectacle in their handsome and colorful uniforms. The Princess Victoria and other royal persons took snapshot pictures while the ceremony was in progress. Queen Alexandra and many notables were present.

A \$50,000 SWORD.

The King wore a jeweled sword that cost \$50,000, which was presented to him by the Maharajah of Jaipur.

The scene on the terrace was a very brilliant one, the European military and levee dress being quite outshone by the splendid apparel of the Indian princes.

The Queen received a greater ovation than the King as both passed a line of notables, bowing and shaking hands. The young sons of the Prince of Wales, the Princess Edward and Albert, constituted themselves aides to the King, and fetched several general officers, who smilingly obeyed their summons to an audience with their grandfather.

The great lawn below the terrace was a marvelous sight in red, yellow, green and blue. The Bengalese, Sikhs, Gurkhas and Punjab cavalry made a strong contrast to a single khaki spot where the British regulars from India stood. At the word of command fluttering lances, rifles and carbines were grounded and the contingents one by one filed past the royal canopy, saluting their majesties and receiving medals at the hands of the Prince of Wales.

At the close of the review the troops were drawn up in front of the King, who addressed the officers as follows: "I wish to convey to all ranks the high satisfaction it has given me to see this splendid contingent from India. I almost feared, owing to my serious illness, that I would be prevented from having the advantage of seeing you, but I am glad to say that by God's mercy I am well again."

ROSEBURY ON CORONATION.

In his speech at the opening of New Park, Eastbourne, on Tuesday, Lord Rosebury said that the statement that he had recently expressed surprise that Great Britain holds fast to ancient ceremony in connection with the coronation was due to a misunderstanding.

"At that ceremony," he said, "not only is the King crowned, but we at that moment consecrate our kingdom. We lay our crown upon the altar, asking the Divine sanction for our Empire, our power, our dominion. As a popular national solemnity the coronation is one in which every citizen and subject, however humble, has an individual part, however indirect or lowly."

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SEIZED HOLD OF "SPIRIT"

So-Called "Spiritualists" Came to Grief—House Soon Cleared.

Lagrange, Ind., Aug. 14.—Excitement prevails at the residence of the Indiana Association of Spiritualists at Chesterfield as a result of the interruption of a seance given by a widely-known medium, Mrs. J. H. Mendenhall, of Muncie, Ind., who has a cottage in the extreme northeast corner of the camp, and on account of the wide reputation of the medium, most of the materializing seances have been held there. About twenty people were gathered for a seance at the cottage, most of whom were not acquainted with each other, and came from all parts of the state.

Mrs. Mendenhall, a member of the Central Christian Church of Chesterfield, around whom were seated several friends, made the exposure by grabbing the supposed spirit, after which a panic ensued.

Mrs. Kimball said: "I was so sure that the spirit was none other than Mrs. Mendenhall that I could not keep from grabbing the woman just to satisfy myself. She told me and my friends that the spirits would materialize, and that I would recognize them. I reached right out, and with both hands got hold of a woman who was standing up. I said to her, 'Make sure that I was no spirit, and while I was holding her someone turned up a lamp and lighted the seance.' I was holding to Mrs. Mendenhall, and in the excitement she saw me. Mrs. Mendenhall fainting."

After the light was turned up great excitement prevailed, and the house was cleared as speedily as possible.

THE PRINCE'S LOVE AFFAIR

His Girl Is Daughter of a Rich Merchant.

PROTEST FROM MRS. DEACON

Against Connecting Her Daughter's Name With the Story of Proposed Marriage.

London, Aug. 13.—Yesterday afternoon a young German student, who was an intimate friend of Crown Prince Frederick William when at the University of Bonn, said: "With reference to the report that the prince wants to marry Gladys Deacon, an American girl, I have just had a letter from her highness saying that the little love affair was settled six weeks ago, and that Gladys Deacon, not an American but a German girl."

"This latest fancy of the prince is a Miss Schuckert, daughter of a wealthy electrical manufacturer at Nurnberg, who attended a seminary at Bonn. The prince liked her and paid her considerable attention, but his imperial father's objection even to a platonic friendship induced the prince to break off the acquaintance."

MRS. DEACON PROTESTS.

Paris, Thursday, Aug. 14.—Mrs. Deacon, who wrote a letter to the Matin protesting against that paper's making her daughter's meeting with the Crown Prince of Germany at Blenheim, the scene of the Duke of Marlborough, a state affair. The Matin, out of regard for Mrs. Deacon's feelings, will discontinue its articles.

Paris, Thursday, Aug. 14.—The French divorce law are signally illustrated by the case of Mme. Baudin, who is suing for divorce on the ground that her husband, who was formerly a member of the cabinet, and M. Baudin's counter-suit. The court has just handed over a judgment giving a divorce to Mme. Baudin, and at the same time granting a similar decree in favor of M. Baudin.

WREATH ON WAGNER'S GRAVE.

Berlin, Aug. 14.—Chancellor Von Buelow placed a wreath on Wagner's grave in the cemetery of Marienfelde, and attended a performance at Parsifal in the evening.
