THE RACE AGAIN DECLARED OFF

But Little Wind and a Heavy Haze Off Sandy Hook.

LIPTON ANXIOUS FOR A FINISH

As He Is Obligated to Return to England Immediately—Little Interest Shown in the Contest.

New York, Sept. 1.—Today's attempt to sail the third race in the international series was another failure, and at 12:50 it was called off for the day because of a lack of wind.

When the committee had signaled the race was off, the yachts dropped their sails, picked up their tows, and made for their anchorages at Sandy Hook.

The committee boat started up the bay flying signals for a race tomorrow.

New York, Aug. 31.—Again today the beautiful cup defender Reliance failed to register her third victory over Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger because the wind failed to blow, and the time limit of five and a half hours expired before she could reach the finish line.

The race was splintered from the beginning. It was laid 15 miles to windward up the Long Island shore and return. Its sailing features were the start, in which Captain Wrings nearly turned the tables on the Yankee skipper and captured the windward berth.

The official starting time of both the yachts was 11:45. Under the five minutes after crossing the line, but Shamrock III, under the lead of her helmsman, Capt. Barr, gave her boat a good full, and she began to walk away from the defender.

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The time at the outer mark was 2:21.00. Reliance led by 20 minutes, 23 seconds, barring time allowance. Reliance at first reached home under a balloon jib topsail, and then carried her spinnaker for a mile, only to resort to hold wind in their jib topsail, both yachts had run off their course, but at 4:30 both set spinnakers and headed straight for the finish.

CALLED BACK TO ERIN

DISABLED AT SEA.

A Mysterious Double Tragedy at St. Louis.

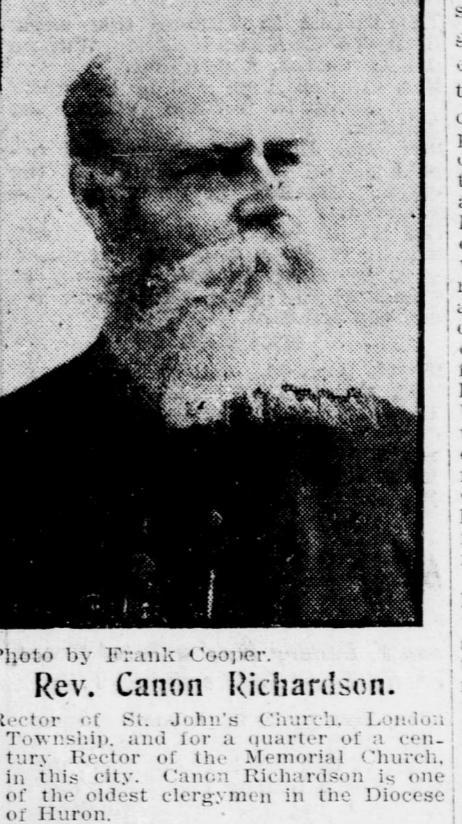
