When he persisted, she fired at him with a 38-caliber revolver, the first ball passing through the doctor's hat and two shots missing him. The fourth shot struck his body two inches be ow the heart, and apparently lodged n his spine.

The woman claims she fired the shot in self-defense, but there is no evidence to prove her statement. George Thorp, who saw the whole affair, says that at no time did the two come in contact with each other; that he could see daylight between
