Man Writes a Book to Prove His Claim to Title.

Berlin, May 12. — A modest artist, who claims to be the world's greatest swindler, has published a remarkable autobiography. His name, he says, is George Manolescu, and he says he was born at Bucharest in 1871, and that at the age of 1 he ran away to sea. Even at that time he had an irresistible tendency

in the Mediterranean ports, but arrived in Athens a year later destitute and requested the Roumanian consul to send him home. The consul refused, whereupon Manolescu attempted suicide in the consu ate and was conveyed to a hospital. The Queen of Greece took an interest i him, and visited his bedside monthl

frauds involving \$200,000. Leaving prison at the age of 23, he assumed the title of Prince Lahovary, and resumed a double career. Out-wardly he was a rich society man, moving in the best circles and living n extravagant style.

Secretly he was perpetrating frauds, committing burglaries, and enriching himself by crime. He married a woman belonging to the German aristocracy, and was a prominent figure at Monte Carlo, winning and losing thousands of dollars. After a decade of successful swinding he was arrested at Berlin and im-

prisoned in a madhouse as a danger ous lunatic. He escaped and after committing a series of burglaries in Berlin, Dresden and other German towns, it is said he finally escaped to America, where he is now living.

Declares Mrs. Dodge at Convention and Her Hearers Agree.

Richmond, Va., May 13. - "The ab solute limit of a woman's capacity for taking care of babies is eight, and sho ought never to have more than six, said Mrs. Arthur M. Dodge, president of the New York Federation of Day Nurseries, while addressing today the Eastern Public Education Association, which is holding its annual meeting

The words of Mrs. Dodge were received with laughter by her hearers, the greater number of whom were women. A doubt pevailing regarding her meaning was not cleared up, some putadherent of the anti-race suicide views of President Roosevelt, while others inclined to the opinion that she simply spoke in her own official capacity as president of a chain of nurseries, and desired to state that one nurse could not care properly for more than eight
