## LOCAL MARKET.

The attendance at the market today was considerably larger than last Saturday, nearly all of the available space was taken up with vehicles, which contained all kinds of produce in season. The demand in nearly all of the lines represented was on the slow side. There was very little change in prices. Grain—Oats were in large supply; demand was good, at \$1.25 to \$1.27 per cwt. The majority of the loads selling at \$1.25 per cwt. A couple of loads of barley sold at \$1.05 per cwt. One small load of corn was marketed, the owner being offered only \$1 per bushel, yet he claimed the supply that he had to charge \$2 per bushel for the same kind of corn.

Several loads of hay that had been bargained for on the previous day were weighed on the city scales; \$3 and \$3.50 was the ruling price.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was dull of sale. There was not such an early lot offered, but the dealers had received large shipments on the previous day. There was a difference in the quality of the butter, and prices ruled accordingly. For choice crocks, 16c to 17c was paid; for pound rolls 15c to 16c. The dealers are asking 21c to 22c per pound for creamery in wholesale lots. Eggs were in good demand at 12c and 13c per dozen. Quite a number are being purchased just now for pickling purposes.

Roots and Vegetables—Potatoes, as on last Saturday, were in large supply. The demand was slow at 70c to 75c per bag by the load, and from 70c to 75c per bag for smaller lots. Asparagus sold well at 12c to 13c per dozen. Radishes and green onions, 25c to 30c per dozen. Rhubarb was a drug at 25c per dozen. Other vegetables as quoted.

Poultry—There was considerable demand and the demand was good; all of the offerings were soon sold. Spring chickens sold at \$1 per pair; they were very small. The dealer who had them on sale says he is willing to pay 20c per pound for nice plump spring chickens. Old fowl sold at 80c to 90c per pair dressed, or 70c to 80c per pair alive. Turkeys, dressed, 12c to 13c for gobblers, and 14c to 15c for hens.

Dressed Hogs—There was good demand and prices were firm at 90c per cwt. So anxious were the holders to secure a supply that they were willing to take the lighter kind, brought same figures as select.

Live Hogs—Old pigs were quite numerous. The demand was rather slow at \$5 to \$10 per pair, the latter price being paid for hogs that would weigh 70 pounds.

Apples—Sales were slow at prices quoted.

Butchers' Meat—The demand was good, the supply was not large as it usually is. Veal was about the only kind of meat that was dull of sale. Beef sold at \$6 for cows and \$7 for heifer beef; mutton, 8c to 9c per lb; spring lambs, \$5 to \$6 each; veal, \$2 to \$3 per cwt.

## STOCK MARKETS.

Carrington today: New York, May 12.—Noon.—Trading in the stock market today was not marked by anything of special interest, but the undertone was reactionary.

The principal sufferers are the Gas companies, and the People's Gas Company of New York, and the People's Gas Company of Chicago. Consumers' Gas broke four issues throughout the country, but of the public utility felt the effect of the decline in these issues. The bank statement today was distinctly unfavorable, showing a decrease in reserves of more than \$2,000,000. Loans increased \$7,500,000, deposits increased \$3,821,000, while cash decreased \$436,000. The market had been reactionary before the publication of the bank statement, and the bad showing emphasized the decline. There was no news of importance and speculative sentiment was inclined to be bearish.
