PORT STANLEYITES BAITED DOCTOR

Medical Health Officer Hutchinson Given a Warm Time at the Lakeside.

Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer of London, was given a rather warm send-off by a large crowd of excited villagers at Port Stanley last night. The doctor has for years kept his yacht, the Nancy, at Port, and yesterday he went down to make arrangements for putting her into commission at once.

The people mistook the purpose of his visit, however, and at once jumped to the conclusion that he was down to secure more reports regarding the Port Stanley water supply. The news that the doctor was in the village spread like wildfire, and soon a crowd of half a hundred people gathered at the depot, where the health officer had been finally located.

To a reporter today, Dr. Hutchinson said that for a time he was at a loss to know what all the hubbub was about. Then he heard a number of young men and women making remarks about germs. "Looking for germs, are you?" shouted one man. "Well, you and English will get all that coming to you." "He's a German," said another. "That's why he's looking for germs." This rally induced a loud laugh, accompanied by the giggles of the young ladies who were present to keep up the courage of their escorts.

"What are the Springfield railway people paying you for?" asked one of the next query delivered in high "C" by a villager. "English knows what he's doing," came from a chorus of voices. "There's something in it for him."

"Hutchinson has microbes in his hat," declared a man who was at the rear. While this was going on the doctor sat as immovable as the Pyramids of Egypt. He observed the crowds closely and he says that he feels quite sure none of the good people of the village were in the assess in the assess. "Keep the people away from Port Stanley and they'll go to Springfield," were the last words he heard as the train pulled out. He declares he will not notice of the disturbance. He has simply done his duty by the people of the city of London, and if the water supply at Port Stanley can be shown to be pure he declares it will give him the greatest satisfaction to certify to it as a matter of fact, and not a matter of opinion. The water there is pure and is not made by Dr. Hutchinson, but by the authorities at Toronto.

A LIVELY SPAT

Health Officers of London and Port Stanley Have Warm Time.

Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer of London, visited Port Stanley on Monday, and in the course of his movements there met Dr. Mothersill, the health officer of the port. The latter accused the London officer with making misstatements concerning the condition of the wells and water at Port Stanley, and the two had it hot and heavy for a few minutes.

The village authorities, while content that no serious germs emanated from Port Stanley, are using all precautions to allay the fears that have arisen. Arthur McDonald, the revenue, states that the two health officers were doing good work looking after the purification of the wells. Those at the Loney House and the Russell House have been thoroughly cleaned and improved, and those on Fraser Heights have also been looked after. The villagers assert that there is absolutely no danger of typhoid infection.

INDIAN ACQUITTED

Charge of Stealing Watches Failed—A Constables' Dispute.

Walden Delaney, an Indian from the Muncie reserve, was dismissed by Squire Lacey yesterday afternoon on the charge of stealing two watches from Julia Watson, also of the reserve, on April 26. Delaney, who is 19 years old, was shown to be the only person, other than the complainant, who knew where the watches were kept, but the crown was unable to bring the theft home to him. A search was made for the timepieces, without avail. Delaney was arrested at camp by Detective Northgreaves, but two other Indians who are also wanted in connection with the robbery, heard of the officer's coming and disappeared. Delaney is not a free man, by any means, as he is now being held here on a charge of entering the store of S. H. Weldon, at Lawrence station on the night of May 22, and stealing a quantity of goods. At the request of Detective Northgreaves, he was yesterday remanded until Thursday. In addition to Detective Northgreaves, County Constable Miller, of Elgin County, claims to be entitled to proceed against Delaney on the burglary charge. The warrant held by Miller was sworn out only two days ago, whereas Northgreaves claims to have had a warrant in his possession for two weeks. In addition, Northgreaves has also recovered the greater part of the drygoods and shoes stolen from Weldon, and he has also witnesses to prove that they were disposed of by Delaney.

EMMA HARVEY'S CASE

Committed for Trial on Charge of Killing Her New-Born Babe.

Toronto, June 27.—Emma Harvey, alleged with William Furness to be responsible for the death of her newly-born child by drowning it in a basin of water, was committed for trial at the assizes in September by Magistrate Denison this morning. Furness was discharged because the evidence given did not implicate him in any way. It will be remembered that the two were arrested three months ago, after Emma Harvey had given birth to a child in a Walton street house, in which Furness resided for a time. Physicians who examined the dead baby said that its death was due to drowning. "Something occurred to prevent the air from reaching that child's lungs," said Chief Coroner Johnston in giving his evidence this morning. William Poulke, a vestryman, said yesterday Dr. Rainsford is expected back in October, and that in recent letters from the doctor, mention was made of any offer from the Archbishop of Canterbury.
