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TRAMP ATTACKS GIRL CAUGHT BY A POSSE

Farmers and Police Near Gananoque Run Down Alleged Bad Character.

Gananoque, June 26.—A tramp giving his name as John Fitzgerald, aged 35, and occupation a sailor, from Montreal, was arrested this afternoon, charged with attempting assault on the 13-year-old daughter of Wm. Spafford, a farmer, living near here.

The rural telephone was used to summon the neighboring farmers and police to go in search of the miscreant, when the attempted outrage was reported to her father by Miss Spafford. Twenty-five farmers scoured the country all morning, and he was captured at Pinley Station, six miles from here. Constable Thompson took charge of the prisoner, and brought him here before Magistrate Carroll, who gave him a preliminary hearing. Miss Spafford identified Fitzgerald as the man who attacked her.

Miss Spafford says she left home in the morning to pick strawberries along the Grand Trunk tracks, and after remarking that the sun had brought the strawberries out, he seized her by the skirt, tearing it off, and threw her to the ground. Miss Spafford resisted desperately, and after five minutes' struggling her assailant was alarmed by an approaching freight and ran away.

When captured he was in the act of attacking another young girl, who hit him across the face. Just then the pursuers came along and caught him as he was climbing a fence to get away.

SENATE INSERTS A RETALIATORY CLAUSE

U. S. Makes Provision to Hit at Canada Through Pulp Duties.

Washington, June 26.—The Senate today revised its previous action on the print paper and wood pulp schedule, agreeing upon amendments relating both to pulp and paper in place of amendments hitherto adopted. The amendments, which were today adopted, were those proposed by Senator Brown, of Nebraska, in accordance with suggestions made in his speech on the subject a few days ago.

When after the disposal of the agricultural implements schedules, the Senate reverted to the pulp and paper provision. Mr. Aldrich stated that he was prepared to accept the amendments, which had been proposed by Mr. Brown. The Nebraska senator was apparently quite as much surprised as pleased at this turn of affairs in his favor.

The Brown amendment for the pulp provision is a complete substitute for House paragraph 492. It provides for the free admission of mechanically ground wood pulp, but authorizes the imposition of a duty of one-twelfth of a cent per pound, dry weight, upon the promulgation of a proclamation by the President declaring that any country, dependency or province has unduly discriminated against the United States by the imposition of an export duty or export charge of any kind upon wood pulp, or upon any kind of paper, or upon any kind of printing material.

On chemical wood pulp a duty of one-sixth of a cent per pound is provided on the unbleached article, and of one-fourth of a cent per pound on the bleached article, and in place of discrimination by the exporting country, the duties are to be doubled.

The amendment to the paper paragraph consists of a provision authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to suspend the duty on newsprint paper in case of discrimination against the United States by the imposition of an export duty or export charge of any kind upon newsprint paper, or upon any kind of printing material. This paper is valued at 3 cents a pound or less, and according to the terms of the House bill, is made dutiable at the rate of five-tenths of a cent per pound.

Explaining his amendments, Mr. Brown said that under them wood pulp would be admitted free, but that in case of discrimination on the part of the Dominion of Canada or any of its provinces, upon proclamation of the President, a duty could be applied. This provision reversed the order of procedure as provided by the original committee amendment.

Senator Clapp expressed his disapproval of any provision allowing the President to place a duty on wood pulp or paper, and said he would discuss the Senate in a parliamentary sense.

Both amendments were agreed to without division.

NIAGARA CAMP ENDS.
Niagara-on-the-Lake, June 26.—At 6 o'clock this evening the historic camp grounds adjoining the lawn were practically deserted. All the volunteers who have been training here for the past two weeks are now either at home or on their way there. The only soldiers who now remain in camp, in addition to Gen. Cotton and his staff, are the regulars from Stanley Barracks, who will remain here until Monday. The reveille sounded at 5 o'clock this morning, and an hour later the first troops left for home. Many of the soldiers packed up their tents last night and slept all night in the open in order to save time this morning. Gen. Cotton stated he was very well satisfied with this year's camp.

THE CHOLERA CASE.
St. Petersburg, June 28.—The number of cholera cases recorded during the past 24 hours shows a diminution. Sixty-one cases were removed to hospitals, and there were 20 deaths.

TOOK A CRAMP.
Troquois, June 27.—A young boy, Dannie Roberts, about sixteen years old, son of Edward Roberts, of this village, was drowned today while bathing in the canal. He, with two other companions, went for a bath, and it is supposed, he took a cramp, as he went down and did not come up again. The body has not yet been recovered.

GIRL MURDERER IS STILL AT LARGE

Police Completely Baffled as to Whereabouts of Leon Ling.

IS NOT IN CHINATOWN

Every Nook and Corner of the Celestials' Quarters Thoroughly Searched.

New York, June 27.—On the ninth, after the discovery of Elsie Sigel's body, and presumably the eighteenth day after the crime was committed, the New York police are obliged to admit tonight that if anything they are a little farther from any clue to the whereabouts of the man who is thought to have killed her than they were on the afternoon when the body was found wedged in an oval-topped trunk in the rooms of a Chinaman who lived above an Eighth avenue chop-suey restaurant.

They still believe that he is sure to be caught eventually, for Leon Ling, the man wanted, was of loose habits, he had little money, his cropped hair and American clothes make him conspicuous and he has alienated the sympathy of many of his countrymen by killing a friend of their race; also because of the wide publicity given the case, isolated Chinamen everywhere are being subjected to the closest scrutiny.

On the other hand, the most significant fact of the case is that there is absolutely nothing to indicate when or how Leon Ling left the city. If it is argued that he still remains here, hidden in the rooms of some friend, it can be argued that every house in Chinatown has been searched, room by room, and every wall and floor sounded. No isolated laundry or restaurant has been overlooked.

The information coming from Newark yesterday that Leon Ling left the trunk in a restaurant there has been substantially confirmed, with slight alterations in details and hours, but it only makes the case more puzzling. It appears today from the books of the Lawrence Cab Company that Li Sing, the restaurant-keeper, did accept the trunk and that he kept it in his place for twelve hours, although he has denied it. But police investigation shows that the trunk was taken to Newark between midnight, June 9, and 1 a.m. June 10, and remained there until the afternoon of the 10th. This places the time of the murder a day ahead of the time previously fixed by the police, and on the same day that the girl disappeared from home.

James F. Halstead, the Newark caddy, who drove Leon and the trunk back after his 12-hour rest in New York, has positively identified the trunk in which the body was found as one he carried, and has further picked out the place where he took it. It is the Eighth avenue restaurant, New York, where the body was subsequently discovered.

The New York caddy who took Leon and the trunk to Newark has not been found, although a Newark caddy and a Newark policeman profess to have seen such a Chinaman in a red taxicab, with an oval trunk outside, early on the morning of the 10th. The police put in some time today trying to run down the red taxicab and its driver, but did not succeed.

Did Leon Take Ship
There is a man by the name of Sanchez, an employee of the New York Transportation Company, who is dead sure that he saw the ubiquitous Leon Ling sail away for Boston on June 10, 11 or 12. At 4 o'clock on the afternoon of one of these days Sanchez, standing on pier 45, East River, amused himself by watching passengers tramp aboard one of the Metropolitan Transportation Company's turbine steamers, whether the Yale or the Harvard, Sanchez can't say. Two Chinese appeared, one was dark, the other light, as Chinese go. They chattered over the disposition of a steamer trunk.

Finally the dark Chinaman boarded the vessel and the light one departed into the city. After spending some hours over a picture of Leon Ling Mr. Sanchez is ready to swear that the dark Chinaman was that same Leon Ling.

No date for the Sigel autopsy has been fixed. The analysis of the contents of the stomach, of which Professor Ferguson, of Columbia, has charge, is not completed.

THE WOODILL TRAGEDY

Police Declare That the Murderer Was Not a Woman.

Baltimore, Me., June 26.—Detective Captain Humphrey, of the Baltimore police, who has been engaged in work upon local clues connected with the Woodill tragedy, scouted the idea today that a woman committed the murder. Captain Humphrey said that it would be useless for him to send men to St. Michaels.

"The man who committed the murder is dead," he declares, "so what is the use of sending men out simply to rake up scandal."

A. Rosenthal, a member of a law firm in New York, who says he represented Eastman at the time he was charged with grand larceny, passed through Baltimore today en route to St. Michaels. Mr. Rosenthal, it is believed, will attach Eastman's property for the benefit of creditors. A reward for Eastman's capture has been pending for some time in New York.

Mr. Rosenthal says he cannot imagine where Eastman got the money to buy the property on the eastern shore and to build the bungalow.
