SHIP CARPENTER'S TALE

The Secret Now in Possession of Hackett, Who is Looking for a Hydraulic Plant.

Victoria, Aug. 17.—Capt. Fred Hackett says he is the only living man who knows the exact history of the Cocos Island treasure, and the exact spot where it is buried. He is a whaling captain and he says he has visited the very spot.

"I have stood over millions," he exclaims, "and only lack of equipment prevented me from getting the huge hoard from its hiding place of more than 70 years." The early history of the treasure is

well known. In 1835 the British barkentine Mary Dier anchored one night under a Peruvian fort near Callao; the anxious garrison, afraid of their Chilean besiegers, placed the great treasure under the protection of the British flag; the crew, one of whom was a man named Thompson, proved false to their trust, and fleeing through the night, buried the Peruvian millions, gold and ewels, in the lonely Island of Cocos. Returning thence, they were dismasted by a cyclone and captured by the Peruvians. Nine of the eleven men on board were hanged at the yardarm. Thompson and a Frenchman were spared to guide their captors to the treasure. But putting into Panama, the fever came on board, and the two prisoners escaped from their harassed guards. They slid down the vessel's side and swam for a whaler which was leaving the harbor. Sharks made the swim a fatal one for the Frenchman, but Thompson clambered on board, the sole possessor of the secret of the buried millions.

From this point Capt. Hackett throws fresh light on the old tale. He has the story from the lips of a seafarer named Keating, who now steps on to the

stage. "I'm telling you something I heard him tell," says Capt, Hackett, "and Keating is the only man but one who ever saw the treasure again." As he strides up and down the room with wide gestures he tells his story simply and with conviction. A Hunted Man.

Thompson next shows up at Kingston, Jamaica, a hunted man. He boards a Newfoundland vessel loading with sugar or molasses in search of a job. 
