### CHINA WILL HAVE A FINE NEW NAVY

Throne Creates Special Department to Insure Efficiency of Maritime Armament

Pekin, Dec. 6.—An important step has just been taken by China with the object of expanding and increasing the efficiency of her army and navy. The throne today issued edicts creating a navy department, which up to the present has consisted merely of a tentative board for naval affairs. naval affairs.

Prince Tsai-Suun, the Emperor's uncle who recently paid a visit to the United States, has been appointed president of States, has been appointed president of the new department, and his full recommendations for the reorganization of the navy have been approved.

The general staff of the army will be reorganized along modern lines, as proposed by General Yin-Tehang, who was at one time minister to Germany, and now is president of the war department. In the edicts the throng wrops the necessarian

In the edicts the throne urges the necessity of making the army and navy effective, and with this in mind dismisses any of the officers of the old school ith a pension.
