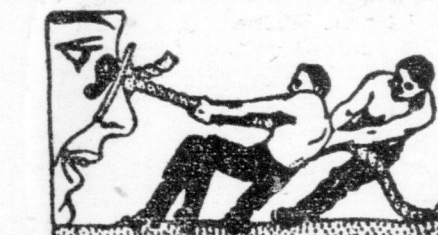

o'clock in the afternoon.

"I'M HIT BELOW BELT"

SAYS PRESIDENT TAFT

"When You Hear Me Squeal
You'll Notice It," Says
Mr. Roosevelt.

Columbus, O., May 8.—Plans for
President Taft's swing through Ohio
next week made public in part here
tonight, indicate that Mr. Taft in-
tends to make a spectacular and
strenuous fight to control the state's
48 delegates to the Republican na-
tional convention.

Plans 75 Speeches.

Entering Ohio next Monday morn-
ing at Marietta, the President will
speak in practically every city and
town of over 5,000 inhabitants that
he has not visited on the tour en-
dred here tonight. The President will
travel more than 1,000 miles in
Ohio by special train, leave a baby-
sitting trail across the state from the
Ohio River to the Indiana State
line, and from Cincinnati to Lake
Erie. Mr. Taft will be in the state
nine days, and on seven of these he
will be in full action. Estimates
tonight were that he would speak at
least 75 times.

"Hit Below Belt."

In Portsmouth, he said: "I'm up
against the wall, and I'm being
hit. I'm being hit below the belt,
and I'm here to stay. I'm here to
stay, and the crowd yelled with de-
light."
Oyster Bay, N. Y., May 8.—Col-
onel Roosevelt tonight read a dispatch
from Portsmouth, O., to the effect
that President Taft, in his speech to-
day, said, "I am being hit below the
belt."

"When you hear me squeal because
I'm hit, then you'll notice it," was
the colonel's comment.

A council of war was held on Sag-
amore Hill today with Col. Roosevelt,
Senator Joseph Dixon, his campaign
manager, and William L. Ward,
New York member of the Republi-
can national committee, as the partici-
pants.
Col. Roosevelt said the purpose of
the conference was to discuss the
Ohio campaign and the situation in
Maryland. The colonel received re-
ports regarding the outlook in Ohio,
but declined to express an opinion
as to his prospects there. He was
greatly pleased, however, with the
reports from the State of Washing-
ton that his supporters there had
won the fight. The only way they
could have kept it away from me
would have been by plain theft,"
said the colonel.

A. YEAGER, OF SIMCOE,

WINS AT MONTREAL

Took a Third With Fascinating
Widow.

Montreal, May 8.—The Montreal
owners continued to carry off the ma-
jority of the ribbons at the horse show
this evening, their horses being par-
ticularly successful in the classes for
hunters and jumpers and for high
steppers. What was expected to be
the feature event, the military jump-
ing, attracted only three entries. This
event was for teams of two officers
twice around over the hurdles and
fence. It was won by Capt. Walter
Bell, of Toronto, and Capt. Walter
Long, D. S. O., A. D. C., Ottawa.

The morning and afternoon events
were nearly all of purely local in-
terest. In the combination saddle and
harness horse class for horses over
15 hands 2 inches, A. Yeager, of Sim-
coe, took a third, with Fascinating
Widow.

The governor-general's cup for
provision-bred, suitable for saddle or
military purposes, three years old and
not over seven years, was won
by Star, owned by Lieut.-Col. Riley, of
this city.

and forty-two persons were killed and
4,706 were injured in train accidents
in the United States during the quar-
ter ended Dec. 31, 1911, according to
the accident bulletin, issued yesterday
by the Interstate Commerce Commis-

number killed and an increase of 877
in the number injured, as compared
with the corresponding quarter of
1910.
