STEIGER SHUT OUT SENATORS WHILE LONDON WON IN NINTH

OTTAWA, August 13. — Scoring the only run of the game in the ninth on a wild peg, London won the first game of the critical series with Ottawa today in the presence of a big weekday crowd. Up till the final round, the contest was a bitter duel between Shocker and Steiger, the London southpaw pitching fewer hits, but losing three passes, two safe blows being made by the Senators, while London collected seven, half of them being scratches. Both pitchers pulled themselves out with great remarkable holes. In the ninth, Steiger, Shaughnessy, first man up, drew four wide ones and pulled a delayed steal that caught Catcher Dunn off guard, but the ball went to centre field, Shaughnessy reaching third, Steiger, however, pitched out and struck out Powers, forced Lage to pop, and Dolan snuffed out the Senators' only run.
