

16,000 ORANGEMEN MODERN DESKS FIGHTING GERMANS FOR NEW SCHOOLS

That Many Canadians of the
Order on Firing Line
Now.

DEDICATION OF LODGE

"Langemack" Will Commemorate
Heroes Who Died
for Britain's Cause.

A large number of Orangemen from this city and district gathered last night in the old Egerton Street Baptist Church to witness its dedication as the official lodgerooms of Langemack Lodge, No. 2425, which although recently organized, has already a membership of 25. Rev. W. C. Riddiford, the worshipful master of London's baby Orange Lodge, presided and was loudly cheered when he said that 16,000 Orangemen from Canada are now on overseas service fighting for the Empire. At Langemack he said Canadians made a name for themselves which will live forever in the annals of the British Empire. There is no one, he said, in East London for another fine Orange lodge, and he predicted that Langemack Lodge will soon be one of the largest and best in the city.

Urges Men to Enlist.
Capt. Pencock, who is chaplain of the 32nd Battalion, now in training on Carling Heights, and grand orator of the Orange lodges of Western Ontario, was given a rousing reception. He spoke of the work he is doing as recruiting officer and urged young men and everyone who possibly can to respond as quickly as possible to the call to the colors. The work to be done, he said, is not a trifling one. He urged young Canadians to enlist more freely.

Bro. E. T. Essery, grand master of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, made the speech of the evening. He declared that 8,000 Orangemen went with the first contingent and that 5,000 or more would go with every grand contingent.

Old Guard Ready.
Amid cheers, he declared that the Old Guard of Orangemen was ready, if he, to shoulder arms and go to the front to a man. He spoke at length upon the principles of the order and told of its growth and development.

During the evening musical selections by the male quartet and Bro. Moore were much enjoyed.

Worshipful Master Crouch of the Guelph Orange Lodge, spoke briefly. He is at present with the ambulance unit of the 34th Battalion and will leave with the battalion on overseas service.

The Latest Models Will Be In-
stalled in Boyle and
Tecumseh.

That Sum Will Be Turned
Over For Use of Quebec
Street Building.

Summer repairs and furnishings for Boyle Memorial and Tecumseh schools were the chief questions under consideration by No. 2 committee of the board of education last evening. The repairs recommended by the building inspector will be carried out, and the secretary was authorized to advertise for tenders for the work.

A recommendation by Inspector C. B. Edwards that one room each in Boyle Memorial and Tecumseh school be furnished with sea desks, similar to samples manufactured, and submitted by Dr. Mullan, for which the price he quoted was \$5 each, was adopted. The inspector pointed out that these desks were much more comfortable for the scholars than the old kind, and more room for writing was given, obviating the necessity of sitting sideways to write.

The committee also approved the inspector's suggestion that white holly and blinds be substituted for the dark ones now in use in many of the older schools on the east, west and south sides.

The Holland, he said, kept out the glare of the sun without making the rooms dark, whereas the dark material shut out practically all light. He said about 100 blinds needed to be changed, and that by using the existing rollers, the cost would be under \$200.

The fire insurance for the city schools this year will total about \$300,000, and this will be divided among the nineteen agents of tariff companies who have offices here. The insurance will be placed approximately on the basis of 30 per cent of the value of the buildings.

The committee will recommend that \$1,000 yearly be set aside for the use of Quebec street school as an East End college. Dr. Mullan, representing the college committee, thought the arrangement would be satisfactory.

FIVE HUNDRED RAISED BY ITALIANS FOR FUND

The Red Cross Contributions
Reach Substantial
Total.

Five hundred dollars have been subscribed to date, for the Italian Red Cross Fund. This was reported at a meeting of the executive last night. C. Catalana, is chairman and Joseph Dambr, secretary.

The executive members declared themselves pleased with the response so far, but are desirous of raising the contributions to a much greater total. Citizens generally are asked to help in the work.

BLAME MANAGEMENT FOR LINE TROUBLES

Railwaymen Criticize Starting
L. and P. S. Till Every-
thing Was Ready.

The city's million-dollar electric line to Port Stanley was paralyzed today, so far as passenger service is concerned, and had it not been for the Pere Marquette coming to the rescue and running a special train to the south, not a mile would have turned. Line troubles are blamed for the electric blockage, according to statements made to The Advertiser. Engineer Galby was brought from Toronto and was out on the line all day.

A good deal of comment was heard today among the taxpayers who were paying the shot. Not a few of them have anything but pleasant memories of a trip they attempted over the new road. Thursday, at Hillcrest, a lot of criticism over the management of the new line attempting to handle holiday business before it was certain that everything was in running order.

LONG VACATION

Courts and Legal Offices Close Up
Shop Early.

The legal machine, so far as the courts are concerned, will be practically at a standstill during the next two months. July and August are vacation months, and only such cases as are deemed immediate adjudication are disposed of by the higher civil and criminal courts. The county magistrates, of course, sit every day if necessary.

Since every man charged with an offence has the right under Canadian law to demand a trial within a reasonable time, a weekly county criminal court is held, whenever necessary, to dispose of cases in which the accused prefers summary trial without a jury to waiting in custody until the courts reopen. A weekly court is also held to dispose of urgent matters.

During the vacation all the offices at the court house are closed during the afternoons. The surrogate office and those of the county clerk and the deputy clerk or the crown clerk at noon, and the sheriff's office at 1 o'clock.

DOCTORS "DUMP" CHIROPRACTORS

Declare These Practitioners
Are Humbugging the
Public.

Will Collect Evidence

"Should Attack Men Guilty of
Malpractice," Says
Physician.

At the meeting of the Ontario Medical Council in Toronto on July 1, the greatest enthusiasm was evinced by the members over the adoption of the regulation providing for reciprocity in registration with the General Medical Council of Great Britain. The question has been before the council on various occasions during the past eight years, and yesterday's decision makes the Ontario Council the third provincial body in Canada to make an agreement with the British board. The regulation passed simply provides that persons registered by the General Medical Council of Great Britain may be registered in Ontario, upon making application, and complying with certain formalities, and that, in return, licenses of the Ontario Council shall be entitled to registration on the colonial list of the British Council without examination.

The late Dr. James MacArthur of this city, president of the Ontario Medical Association, during his term of office, worked zealously towards this end, desiring during the great war crisis in the East, the object of the Ontario medical men might further strengthen the ties existing between Canada and the mother country.

At the meeting in Toronto Dr. Robert Ferguson of this city was inclined to press for an addition to the regulation of a rider to the effect that the privileges granted to British physicians should not be extended to foreigners entitled to practice in Great Britain and Ireland. It is understood that Dr. Ferguson's object in so doing was to discriminate against men with little more qualification than is required for a chemist, who, owing to the fact that they are licensed in the old country, will be able to practice here on equal terms with the graduates of Canadian colleges, fully licensed, through passing Ontario Medical Council examinations.

The proposal was dropped, owing to the fact that other members urged that the council should not make a half-concession to the motherland at the present time.

GERMANS CLAIM ARGONNE ADVANCE

Say Crown Prince Got Three-
Mile Front and 1,710
Men.

[Canadian Press].
LONDON, July 2.—According to the official statement issued at Berlin today, the enemy has advanced over a front three miles long and about 300 yards wide, as a result of a determined artillery and infantry attack in the Argonne region northwest of Le Four-de-Paris. The troops which engaged in this were from Wurtemberg, under the command of the German crown prince. The Germans claim to have captured 25 officers and 1,710 men, besides machine guns, forty mine-throwers and one revolver cannon.

The French report, on the contrary, states that the Allies were able to hold all their positions in this region, although the enemy, after a very violent bombardment, attempted a new and general attack between the roads leading to Benarville and Blainville. The fighting, it is said, was very stubborn, developing in places into a hand-to-hand encounter.

Reports state that the Germans secured a foothold in the French works at Hillgenfrist in the Vosges. The French explain, however, that this position was regained.

ONLY ARRANGEMENT MADE BY ROBLIN WAS FOR SAW-OFFS

Former Premier Denies the Fullerton
Charges—No Money Transaction.

Winnipeg, July 2.—Sir Rodmond Roblin, on the stand this afternoon before the commission appointed to investigate the charges made by C. P. Fullerton, K.C., on behalf of the fourteen private members of the Manitoba Legislature, declared he had no knowledge of any matters on which the charges were alleged to have been based, nor had he anything to do with the publication of the charges made. He stated that he was ignorant of any arrangements with the Liberals, save regarding the "saw-offs" which he had been customary in every election he had been interested in during the whole of his public life.

Counsel pointed out that Dr. McPherson, M. P., was one of the fourteen members mentioned and that an arrangement for a saw-off in connection with his election protest was one of the number proposed.

Sir Rodmond said that Dr. McPherson had known of the "saw-off" plan in connection with the protest against his own campaign, but had raised no objection. He did not think that a "saw-off" would be material for a royal commission's investigation.

As to the money part of the charges Sir Rodmond averred he had no knowledge of any monetary transactions between his cabinet and the Liberals.

Philippen the Go-Between.
The premier was examined as to the circumstances surrounding his resignation. The negotiations had been carried on by F. H. Philippen, who told him that Mr. Hudson had agreed that the royal commission should consist of laborers and a civil suit be instituted against Kelly, provided Sir Rodmond resigned as premier. The plan had been changed, but did not know whether Mr. Philippen's copy handed to him was changed, or whether he had changed it unintentionally in dictating to his stenographer.

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Official Report.
The report issued by the French war office tonight says:
"During Friday, on the entire front from the Yser to the Argonne, there was nothing but artillery duels, especially in the region of Quennewieres."
"In the Argonne, the enemy, after a very violent bombardment, attempted a new and general attack between the roads leading to Benarville and Blainville. After an especially stubborn fight, which at certain points developed into a hand-to-hand encounter, we were able to hold all our positions."

"Yesterday evening the Germans, after most intense artillery preparation, attempted on our positions at Hillgenfrist (in the Vosges) a series of attacks, the first two of which were repulsed. In the course of the third attack the enemy succeeded in gaining a foothold in our works. Through a counter-attack we recaptured this morning all our positions, which the Germans are continuing to hold."

"In the Dardanelles, after the successes gained by the British troops on June 28, the Turks attempted several violent counter-attacks against the positions taken from them. They were repulsed with heavy losses."

"On June 30 we carried a Turkish re-doubt in the form of a quadrilateral, including six successive lines of trenches. The ground is covered with the bodies of Turkish soldiers. We have not been counter-attacked."

KALTSCHMIDT SAYS PLOT IS HATCHED TO ELIMINATE HIM

Feels That His Case Is Similar to
Dernburg's—Has Service to
Perform.

DETROIT, July 2.—Albert Kaltschmidt, named as the principal in the Windsor dynamite conspiracy by William Lefler, declares he is a victim of a plot, the object of which is to force him to leave the country. He declined to go into details, but intimated his case is similar to that of Dr. Dernburg.

"Dr. Dernburg came here to do a certain work," he said. "He accomplished a part of it, and then was driven away from the country by opposition of the press. Similar work is being done here, and I have the honor, or misfortune, to be active in it."

Pressed for an explanation of this work, Kaltschmidt laughed, and replied: "Everybody knows I am secretary of the Deutscher Bund. But the work we are doing is only a drop in the bucket compared to this great world movement."

Kaltschmidt said he had been manager of the Marine City Salt Company for the past two years. Previously he was manager of the Tate Electric Light and Power Company, whose plant Lefler confessed he had been paid to blow up, and he had lived in Detroit at 84 Hancock avenue east.

Silent on Some Things.
Asked whether he was an officer in the German army, Mr. Kaltschmidt declined to reply.

"It has been stated that you are, Albert," said Kaltschmidt's wife, who was present at the interview.

"That makes no difference," was the reply. "I cannot be too careful."

Kaltschmidt's attention was called to a statement that Lefler's arrest had come about largely through the confession of Schmidt and Stephens, the two men arrested in Port Arthur recently.

He attempted to blow up a bridge, tried said Detroit men had paid them \$200 to obtain information on Canadian Pacific train movements.

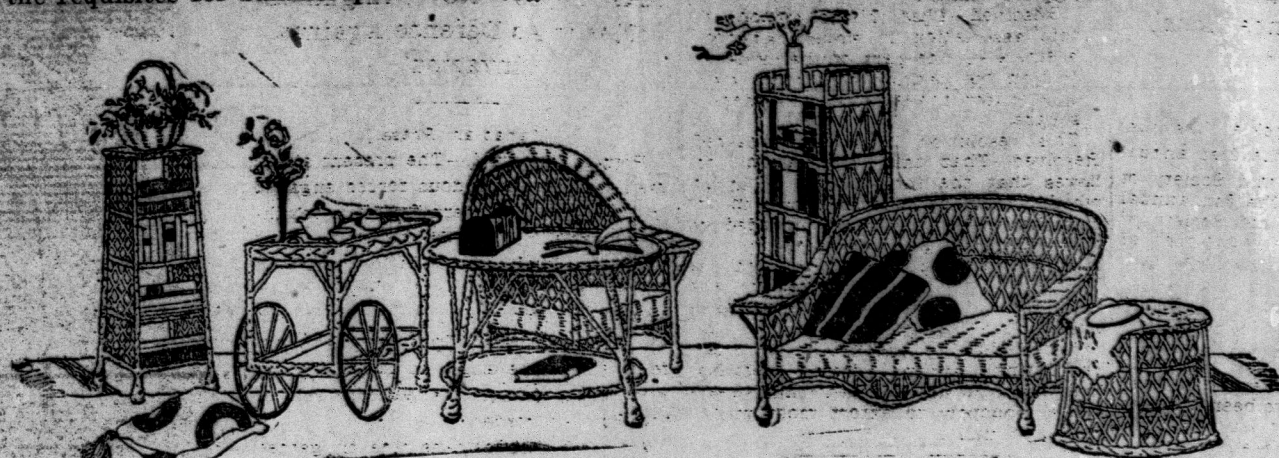
