

LONDONERS WIN AND LOSE BOTH IN B. C. FIGHT

Hon. Thomas Taylor Goes Down to Defeat; M. A. MacDonald Wins.

LIBERAL IS VICTORIOUS

Former City Lawyer, Despite Premier's Attacks, Wins in Vancouver.

ANOTHER ONE ASSISTS

Charles MacDonald One of the Most Influential Liberal Campaigners.

British Columbia elections, the returns for which while not complete indicate a great Liberal sweep, have a considerable local interest in London. One of the leading Liberal members-elect for the city of Vancouver, M. A. MacDonald, is a London Old Boy, while one of the Conservative cabinet ministers who went down to defeat, Hon. Thomas Taylor, is another from London.

For years Hon. Thomas Taylor, sitting at the member for Revelstoke, has been a member of the British Columbia cabinet. He has been minister of public works since 1913, and minister of railways since 1911. Mr. Taylor was born in this city on February 4, 1867.

Mr. MacDonald, the successful Liberal candidate of Vancouver, was a member of the legal firm of Fraser & Moore in this city, and is slated to become lieutenant to the Liberal leader. He has been the storm centre of the political fight in Vancouver city, and the personal attacks made on him by Premier W. J. Bowser, Conservative leader, were a feature of the campaign there.

Changes of "plum" were made against Mr. MacDonald by the Tory chief, but they were absolutely discredited. The manner in which the electoral college regarded these charges is significant for its own sake, and also for the fact that Mr. MacDonald at the head of the polls, and the head of the Conservative party far from in the lead.

After leaving London, some ten years ago, Mr. MacDonald went to Cranbrook, B. C., and later to Vancouver, where he immediately became a figure in politics. He is a Bruce County Old Boy.

Another London lawyer who figured prominently in the B. C. elections, and another MacDonald, too, was Charles MacDonald, a brother of Mrs. W. J. Carson of 28 Port Street, Mr. MacDonald was nominated for one of the Vancouver ridings, but did not enter the contest as a candidate. He took a prominent part in the campaign, however, and was one of the most effective speakers on the Liberal side.

Charles MacDonald was a law student in London, and afterwards practiced here at Hildesheim and in Toronto. Later still he held a judicial position in the Yukon, and came to Vancouver some years ago.

SPECIAL TRAIN CARRIES 111TH ON "LAST LEAVE"

Members of Waterloo Battalion Go Home Today.

Twelve coaches and a baggage car were necessary to carry the men of the 111th Battalion, with their effects, to Galt this morning, via the C. P. R. special train. The South Waterloo unit has been assigned for immediate service overseas, and this is the last opportunity of its members to see their friends and relatives at home.

Practically the whole unit, including Lieut. Col. J. D. Clark and his staff, of the leave, only a sufficient number of men being left to carry on the ordinary duties of the unit.

The men had a quick trip to Galt, arriving there at 9:30 a.m. They immediately dispersed to their homes. They are to report back to camp here on Monday morning, when they will settle down to the last part of their training in Canada.

No day has yet been set for the departure of the unit.

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DRUGGISTS REFUSE TO HANDLE LIQUOR SAVE AS MEDICINE

City Men Will Not Take Out Licenses.

FILL PRESCRIPTIONS ONLY

Advice of Prov. Secretary That Special Permit Unnecessary Accepted.

Every druggist in the city has taken a definite stand relative to the liquor question, and after 7 o'clock Saturday evening not a drop of liquor will be procurable in any drug store in the city, and the only liquor that the druggists will keep in stock will be the quantity required only for prescription purposes.

This decision on the part of the druggists has been made since the receipt of Hon. W. J. Hanna's reply to the letter from the Druggists' Association which was submitted to the provincial secretary ten days ago.

The question submitted to the provincial secretary was whether it would be necessary for a druggist to take out a license to handle liquor for medicinal or manufacturing purposes.

The reply to this question was received from Hon. W. J. Hanna on Tuesday, his decision on the matter being that it was not necessary for the druggist to secure a license to handle liquor, on condition that he did not have other liquors in stock to be sold for other purposes.

From the time copies of the Ontario liquor act were distributed the druggists here, they have been opposed to the handling of liquors, and are only too well pleased at the decision given out by Hon. W. J. Hanna, which releases them from handling liquors or alcohol except for medicinal or manufacturing purposes.

The druggists of the city also appreciate the fact that a "vendor's license" has been granted in the city, which permits of their procuring liquor in small quantities, and at the same time eliminating freight charges.

WANT FULL BOARD TO DEAL WITH ARBITRATION

The board of control today received the recommendation of the utilities commission that a court of arbitration be appointed to take over the management of the city's waterworks, and this is the last opportunity of its members to see their friends and relatives at home.

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LONDON AUTO MANAGER BACK FROM CONVENTION OF COMPANY OFFICIALS

The relations between the council and the utilities commission are not exactly harmonious, and there seems to be much friction.

What will be the outcome is also more or less shrouded in mystery. It is said that the commission will retain Frank G. Gunn, an accountant, with Arch Sceraton and Andrew Dale doing the auditing work.

The council wants Mr. Dunlop to do all the work. The aldermen, at sea, much as they want Mr. Dunlop to devote all his time to city auditing, at a much less salary than Mr. Jewell received for part time. That, at least, is the way it looks out.

When Mr. Dunlop arrives, it is expected that the situation will be cleared up. With two good men better results can be obtained, and the city will benefit, it is claimed.

NOT FIVE GALLONS OF SCOTCH WHISKY FOR SALE IN TOWN

Dealer Says That Stocks Are All Gone.

OTHER LIQUORS SCARCE

But Montreal Is Prepared to Export for Family Use.

You will have to hurry because the stocks are running low and even certain brands of the good stuff have been sold out completely, said a retail liquor dealer to an Advertiser reporter today who managed to finally "worm" his way to the warehouse through a throng of thirsty travelers, all bent on the one mission, getting liquor refreshments for future consumption.

"If you're Scotch you will have some difficulty, I believe, in getting Scotch whisky, because I don't believe there are five gallons left in the city yet," continued the liquor dealer.

The same condition prevails regarding gin, so those who have not got their "kick" and gin already bought are "up against it" now at this late stage of the game.

In the hotels the stocks have been reduced to such an extent that many drinks cannot be served.

"Give me a drink of Scotch, some good stuff," said a Scotchman in a hotel bar today, but the white-aproned bartender sadly shook his head, and said: "Nothing doing."

"Why what's the matter I can pay for it, besides I am not on the Indian list, either," said the Scot.

"That may be true, my friend, but we haven't a drop of Scotch in the city, it's all been picked up," said the bartender, who kept busy drawing beer from the faucet.

Thursday night every bar in the city was jammed to capacity. Some of the hotelmen declare that if the run continues their stocks will be exhausted by Saturday noon, and they will be forced to close then or sell "soft stuff."

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20 HOTELS IN CITY WILL OPERATE UNDER STANDARD LICENSE

Only Two of Present License Officers Off List.

NEW INSPECTOR WORKING

Is Delivering Licenses to Those Approved by Ontario Commission.

With the exception of two all the license holders in London have been granted "standard hotel" licenses by the Ontario License Commission. The only two licensees that are not continued under the regime are those of the Merkle House on King street, and the Canada Railway News at the Grand Trunk station.

The newly appointed license inspector, Mr. J. E. Keenleyside, was busy today distributing the licenses to the successful applicants. Mr. Keenleyside will be officially gazetted tomorrow, and will assume the duties of his new office on Monday morning.

Carries Special Privileges. The "standard" hotel license carries a number of special privileges. The hotelmen of the city are deliberating on an increase in rates, but will not make the announcement as to what the increase will be until the prohibition becomes effective.
