Every druggist in the city has taken a definite stand relative to the a definite stand relative to the liquor question, and after 7 o'clock Saturday evening not a drop of liquor will be procurable in any drug store in the city, and the only liquor that the druggists will keep in stock will be the quantity required only for prescrip-

tion purposes.

This decision on the part of the druggists has been made since the receipt of Hon. W. J. Hanna's reply to the lettergram of the Druggists' foster nome committee of the Children's Aid Society met in the offfice of Sheriff Cameron this morning. 
