

COMMERCIAL VEHICLES BARRED FROM PARK

One-Way Traffic Also Instituted by New City Bylaw.

A bylaw restricting traffic in Victoria Park was passed at a meeting of the public utilities commission held Thursday afternoon to become effective at once. This bylaw prohibits commercial vehicles in the park entirely, and restricts all other vehicles to 12½ miles per hour, bicycles and motorcycles being required to proceed at a speed not exceeding five miles per hour.

One-way traffic is also instituted by the bylaw, all vehicles entering the park at any point being required to keep to the right with turning around and reversing directions taboo. Upon entering the park drivers must turn to the right, thus insuring one-way traffic.

No bicycles will be allowed on the footpaths, and pedestrians are prohibited from making thoroughfares other than those present. Water closets are also protected by the bylaw as are also the trees and flowers in the park. The bylaw which was passed unanimously provides a maximum penalty of a \$50 fine or six months in jail with or without hard labor for offenders.

Protection for Pedestrians. Although the city council requested that the park be closed entirely to vehicles the commission decided on the above compromise as announced exclusively in The Advertiser Thursday, the members being of the opinion that such measures will greatly reduce any danger in Victoria Park to children regarding the possibility of persons being caught between vehicles proceeding in opposite directions is eliminated and decreased speed limits also serve as a protection.

The commission authorized the general manager to proceed with the erection of a separate building for the new filter plant instead of in the basement of the pumping station as previously planned. It is estimated that an actual cost of \$1,200 will cover this alteration, which is considered reasonable in view of the saving in space in the basement which can be utilized advantageously for other purposes. The new building will also be an improvement on the former plan, according to E. V. Buchanan, general manager.

The commission decided not to insure the service transformers located on different city streets, in view of the fact that the premium asked by the insurance companies exceeds the average losses incurred by damage to this equipment by fire and lightning.

ST. ANDREW'S INDUENTS ASSISTANT PASTOR

Rev. W. R. McIntosh addressed the new minister, presenting to him an outline of his new duties, and pledging the support of the people and the church in his undertaking. He stated that the congregation will look to the new pastor for religious education and that he will be responsible for the work among the young people, also for the guidance and direction of the girls' work of the Sunday school.

Mr. Harris comes to St. Andrew's Church, following a successful ministry in Bristol, Quebec. Before going to Bristol, he was connected with Y. M. C. A. work in Massachusetts, where his work specially pertained to the young men and boys of the district. His work in London will be on somewhat similar lines. He is a graduate of the University of Toronto in arts and of the Knox College in theology.

Following the services, Mr. Harris was introduced to the congregation, and a social hour and supper were held in St. Andrew's Hall.

NOTED SALVATIONIST COMING TO LONDON

Commissioner Sowton of Toronto Will Be in Charge of London Area.

Commissioner Charles and Mrs. Sowton of Toronto, have been appointed to succeed Commissioner and Mrs. Richards at London, who have been ordered to take command of the Western Australian territory, with headquarters at Melbourne.

A wire was received by Brigadier A. Crichton to this effect late Wednesday afternoon, from Colonel J. McMillan, of brigade headquarters, Toronto.

Commissioner Sowton has been in charge of the Salvation Army in Sweden for the past two years, and previous to that was the first commissioner of Western Canada, with headquarters at Winnipeg.

Fifteen years ago the commissioner was chief secretary for Canada, and from there was appointed to proceed to India and take supreme charge of the territorial command in that country.

Since then he has filled several important positions in the Salvation Army throughout the world, and his appointment as successor to Commissioner Richards is looked upon by the Salvation Army officials as a satisfactory one. He has a pleasing personality and a level business head, and the officials look upon themselves as being fortunate in having his services in this capacity.

The welcome meetings will be held in London at an early date, and the official installation is expected to take place some time late in November or early in December.

The new commissioner is said to be quite a linguist, having served his apprenticeship in Scandinavian, Indian, Swedish and other foreign countries.

REFURNISHING PARLIAMENTARY ROOMS.

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—Contracts for the new furniture for the reading-room, members' quarters, etc., in the new Parliament Buildings have been let, and next session will see these apartments much improved in appearance. It is understood that contracts for the furniture were placed with half a dozen different firms.

Entrance to the buildings will be through the main door, as well as through the two side entrances leading to the House of Commons and Senate respectively. It is expected that work on the Hall of Fame, which leads from the main entrance to the door of the library, through the center of the building will be well advanced, if not completed, when the House meets again.

HAROLD MEEK AGAIN DELIGHTS LONDONERS

Frances Corey Assists in a Cleverly-Variied Program At Wesley Hall.

Harold Meek's reintroduction to London last night as Edouard Albin, the general director of the Washington Opera Company, was indeed a happy one. His baritone voice of rich magnetic quality, was heard once more in a program which brought pleasure to everyone in the unfortunately small audience which gathered in Wesley Hall to hear him. Certainly it is a disgrace to the city, that its people did not turn out in larger numbers to hear such distinguished artists as Harold Meek and his delightful companion of the evening, Frances Corey, a lyric soprano, whose charming stage presence and beautiful voice soon captivated the few who were privileged to hear her.

Harold Meek's program was cleverly varied in its numbers, but there was still room for a number of the big dramatic compositions in which he is heard at his best. One number followed another, each bringing with it new delights and displaying with loving care the beauty and richness of his voice.

Artist Excels. The climax of the evening and of the program as well came with his final encore, the intensely dramatic song, "Invictus," sung with an intensity of feeling and artistic appreciation, that almost brought the audience to its feet. "Dune Prison" (Hahn) was another number in which the artist excelled. A tragic piece of music, it was sung with all the sympathy and feeling which might be expected from a master of the song, such as the artist of last evening.

Perhaps one of the most beautiful pieces of the whole evening was contained in the last group, "Alibi," by Chadwick, sung gracefully and yet with religious fervor. Other numbers were "Pipes of Gordon's Men" (Hammond), "Eleanor" (Coleridge-Taylor), "Hymn to the Night" (Campbell-Tipton), "Prison" (Borodine), very dramatically rendered; "Adieu du Matin" (Pessard); the aria, "Benvenuto" (Diaz), "Bois Epais" (Lully), "Caro Selvo" (Handel), "L'Unité Dal Caro Selvo" (Scechi), and an old English drinking song by Shield.

Frances Corey's lovely lyric soprano voice contrasted delightfully with Mr. Meek's baritone. Although decidedly a lyric soprano, Miss Corey's voice has none of the sweetness which sometimes characterizes voices of that type. Soft, but clear as a silver bell, and as easily as breathing, it rendered the numbers on her program last evening.

Two of her numbers, perhaps, "Dawn" (Chadwick), and "L'Unité Dal Caro Selvo" (Scechi), were particularly noteworthy, being mentioned as the most delightful, not forgetting the lovely little lullaby, which seemed just to float out into the hall as an encore. "Hymne au Soleil" (Georges), was another attractive number, as were "The Cry of the Waters" (Campbell-Tipton), "The Wind in the Corn" (Clarke), "Love Has Wings" (Robers), and "The Bird of the Wilderness" (Horsman).

Miss Corey sang charmingly in spite of the difficult acoustical properties of the sparsely-filled hall, which worked against her. Stanley Oliver was an able accompanist for this concert put on under the auspices of the Institute of Musical Art.

COL. REID PRESIDENT OF HUMANE SOCIETY

Popular Londoner Elected at Last Night's Meeting of Organization.

Lieut.-Col. Eric Reid, D. S. O., was unanimously elected president of the Humane Society at the first meeting since the summer holidays held in the city hall last night. Col. Reid fills the position left vacant by Stanley Meredith, who resigned four months ago because of other duties.

The meeting was well attended, a large number of juveniles, who are taking a great deal of interest in the work of the society, being present. The members urged that all men's clubs in the city co-operate with the society in its good work of keeping the city free from stray and troublesome animals.

Inspector G. Tustin announced that the kennels belonging to the society were empty, all the dogs collected having been placed in homes in the surrounding district.

Three dogs which were picked up from the street by the humane inspector and placed in good homes repaid their owners by being prizewinners at the dog show recently held.

The report read by Inspector Tustin showed that during July 294 cases were brought to their notice. So far this month 294 cases have received attention at the hands of the society. The inspector was responsible for a large number of citizens appearing in police court because of cruelty to animals during the four months.

It was announced that a rummage sale for the purpose of raising funds for the society would be held some time during October.
