watching my sister, who was my only attendant, dressing for some time be-fore I began my own toilette at all. Quite frequently the fitters who made the wedding dress are sent to the house to put on any finishing touches that might be necessary.

At an appointed time, all her wedding attendants such as bridesmaid, the maids of honor and the flower girls gather at her house before they proceed to the church. For this reason the bridegroom always

sends the bouquets to the bride's home. When it is time to go to the church the entire bridal party is conveyed there and awaits the bride in the vestibule. Usually the mother of the bride goes to the church in the first carriage alone, or she may include one or two of the bridesmaids, but there must be one vacant seat in her carriage or car for her husband, who

will return home with her.

The next vehicles convey the maid of honor and the rest of the brides-maids. A bride may have as many bridesmaids as she wishes, but the number should be in keeping with the size of the wedding.
