

HANDSOME NEW PATROL TO CONVEY LAW BREAKERS

Police Commission Will Purchase New Motor Combination Patrol Ambulance.

WILL HOLD TEN

Magnificent Equipage Costing \$3,112 Ready For Use in Two Months.

How would you like to have a ride in a big, magnificent motor equipage, costing \$3,112, attended by a uniformed chauffeur and a footman and with a big brass rail behind?

In order to take a trip in such a chariot one will have to run foul of the law or arrange to be an emergency case for one of the hospitals. For the auto mentioned is none other than the new motor combination patrol ambulance that the police commission decided to purchase at a meeting yesterday afternoon in the secret confines of Chief Birrell's office.

The tender was let to the McLaughlin Motor Company of Canada, after the commission had considered a total of nine tenders. The new "Black Maria" will be delivered in about two months, the chief expects. Apparently Chief Birrell is expecting to do a rushing business in the future, for he specifies that the patrol must be built to hold ten prisoners. The engine will be a 65-horsepower affair, so that no time will be lost in bringing in the grist for the

police court mill. Solid Comfort. The seats will have deep cushions, covered with good material, proving beyond a doubt that the head of the

force has the interests of the prisoners at heart. The interior of the patrol will have two dome lights, so that constables riding with their faces will be able to keep tab on their guests.

There will be a small door at each side, used only in ambulance cases. The main entrance will be from the rear, where nice brass rails will serve as decorations. Metal panels will grace the doors, and the interior lining will be basswood in either black, white or mahogany finish. The ventilating windows will, of course, be properly barred.

The patrol will be painted dark blue to conform with the feelings of all those unfortunate enough to become passengers.

The police commission has specified that the springs must be specially good so that there will be little or no discomfort for patients who are being rushed to the hospital at a speed of 40 miles an hour. There will be two sets of stretchers and the patrol can be changed quickly into an ambulance with room for attendants and a two-foot space for patients.

Park-Driving Question. T. W. McFarland of the P. U. C. was present at the meeting to thresh out the question of allowing vehicles to drive in Victoria Park.

The public utilities has maintained that the park should be open at all times to vehicles, while Mayor Wenige and the council insist that it should be closed.

Chief Birrell was not for handing out any information on this subject, merely stating that Mr. McFarland should bring his proposition to the attention of the council.

The resignation of Constable Wm. Pruder was accepted by the commission and the application of Steven Eddy for the position was approved.

Constable Pruder, who has been with the department for 23 months, was considered a splendid officer. He leaves for a position on the Toronto force with some of his old comrades from Owen Sound.

FIREMAN RESCUES BABE FROM FIRE

Fireman Edevane Saves 18-Months-Old Baby From Suffocation.

The 18-months-old baby of T. T. Snider was rescued yesterday afternoon from the second floor bedroom of the house at 289 Ridout street by Fireman Edevane, attached to the central fire hall. The child had been forgotten in the excitement of trying to remove the furniture from the burning house, and when the firemen reached the child it was almost suffocated from the smoke.

When the firemen arrived they were not told about the child on the second floor, and they had been there about five minutes before the fact was known. It was with great difficulty that the child was brought out of the room, as the hose had already been turned.

The house is owned by the C. N. R. The inside of the house was destroyed by the flames which started in the kitchen. Almost all the furniture was saved, except that in the kitchen. The back roof was totally destroyed, and as the house is next to a pile of coal in the C. N. R. yards it was a supreme task to prevent the fire spreading to the coal pile.

Volumes of smoke hampered the firemen in their efforts to combat the blaze. Although a steady stream of water was played on the roof, the flames refused to die out because of the tar paper material covering the roof.

Kiwanians Entertained At Jolly Garden Fete

Mr. and Mrs. Samuel G. While the guests, to the number of about 200, were foregathered on the spacious lawn, beautifully and charmingly decorated for the occasion with flags, Chinese lanterns and booths, music was provided by the Kiwanis Club orchestra. Wilfred Hodgins led in the singing of a number of popular and community songs. Mrs. Wm. Wortman and Wilkins Shuff were heard with much pleasure in vocal solos, each responding to enthusiastic applause by singing an encore.

Congratulates Club. The address of the evening was given by Verne Buchanan of the Ingersoll Kiwanis Club. Mr. Buchanan referred to the fact that the London Kiwanis Club had "sponsored" the Ingersoll Club. He congratulated the local club in having been honored by numbering amongst its members Bevon Hay, past governor of Ontario and Quebec. None had done more for the Kiwanis cause than he, declared Mr. Buchanan. Fred Lawton, also a member of the London Club, is the present incumbent of the office of district vice-president.

At the close of the brief fifteen minute period Mr. Beattie commented upon the magnificent conception which had prompted All Kiwanis Night and the common program. "Every member of a Kiwanis Club present should be inspired by this program," affirmed Mr. Beattie in conclusion, "to become a better Kiwanian and a better man."

Telegrams Received. Fraternal telegrams were received and read by Chairman Beattie from the Kiwanis Clubs of Hamilton, the pioneer club of the province, Galt, Hull, Guelph, Toronto, Brantford and Kitchener-Waterloo. A telegram from Tom Yull, president of the club, ran as follows: "Denver crowded with Kiwanians and ablaze with Kiwanis enthusiasm. Fred Lawton and Hugh Marley send greetings. Will think of you at the zero hour tonight."

At the conclusion of the more formal program there was orchestra music, dancing on the green sward, listening in on the radio and lunch. The orchestra included Wm. Wortman, Frank McLaughlin, Fred Weeks, Gibson Ward and Ed. Shuttleworth.

Upon making his appearance on the veranda, which served as a platform, Mr. Amoro was greeted with a hearty rendition of that ever-popular song "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." Mrs. Amoro seconded her husband's words of welcome in an apt speech.

The gathering, which was a most enjoyable and charming affair, was voted a distinct success by all who attended. Mr. and Mrs. Amoro were spoken of on all sides as hosts par excellence.

COUNCIL OBJECTS TO REDISTRIBUTION

Request To Be Forwarded Asking Larger Representation in Federal House.

A request to Ottawa, asking that London be represented in the Federal House by a larger number of members, and that no areas of the city be included in the county, was ordered to be sent from the London City Council at last night's meeting on the motion of Ald. Douglass, chairman of the finance committee.

Ald. Greer thought that fewer, rather than more, representatives in the Federal House was the need of the hour in the Dominion, but agreed with the motion in general, and voted in favor of it.

The council was strongly in favor of not allowing any area of the city to be included in the county in the new distribution arranged by Ottawa, and made it quite clear their disapproval of the recently-announced scheme of political redistribution.

TRAFFIC IS EXPANDED BY VISITORS TO BRITAIN

Increasing Travel To Empire Show Necessitates Extra Accommodations.

Quebec, June 16.—Indications that the eastward passenger traffic, via the St. Lawrence River, in connection with the thousands of Canadians and Americans who will visit the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley, will attain unprecedented proportions during the present season, is contained in the announcement by the White Star Dominion Line that the Ellerman Line, City of Exeter, a ten thousand ton passenger steamer, is now on her way up the St. Lawrence River bound for Montreal and Quebec, where she will take care of the overflow of passengers from other lines at those ports.

OFFER ODD CONTRACT FOR GOVERNMENT JOB

Profit-Sharing Plan For Engraving Bank Notes, Bonds and Stamps.

Ottawa, June 16.—Among the tenders received by Acting Minister of Finance Robb today for the making of engraved bank notes, bonds, postage and revenue stamps, as at Oct. 1, 1925, is one from the Dominion Banknote Company, which is unique in that it proposes a profit-sharing plan with the government.

The government would be permitted to share in the earnings of the company to the amount of one-third of its profits, with the further option of purchasing the plant and equipment at the expiration of this contract.

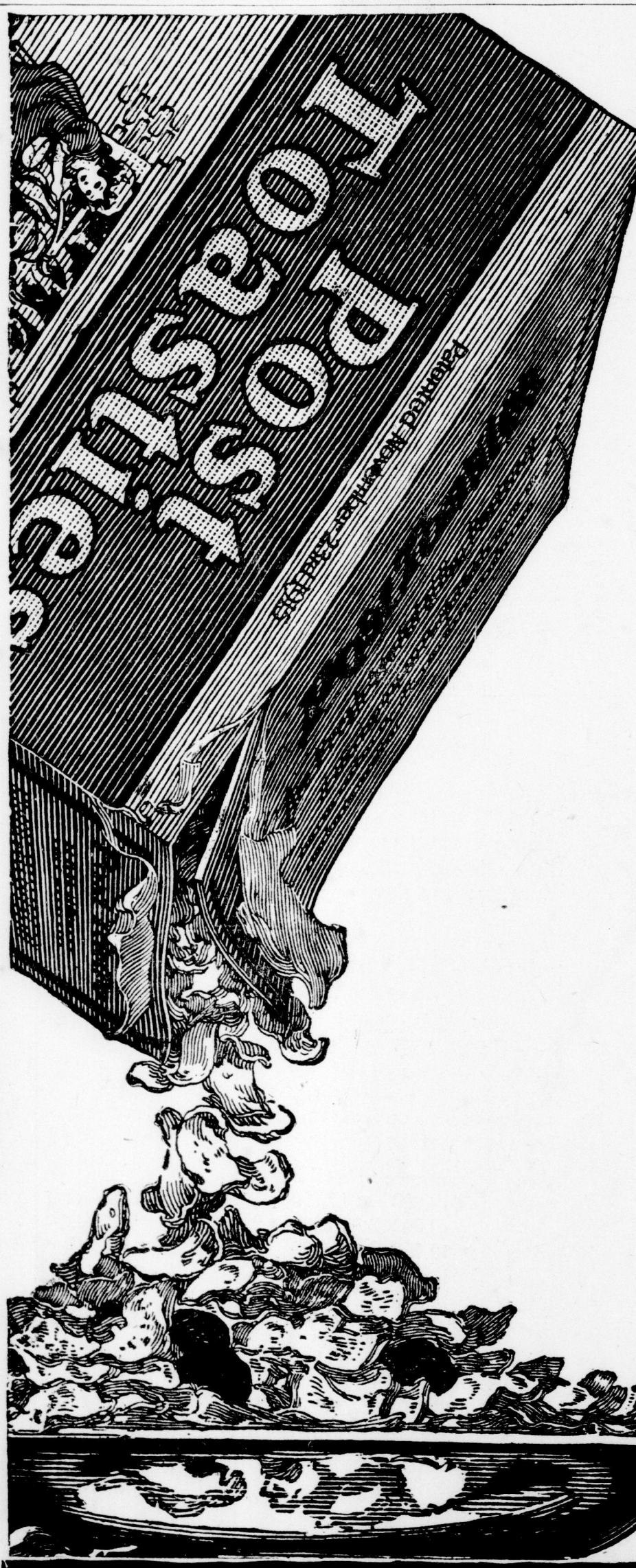
