### CITY INSTITUTE OPENS MUSICAL BRANCH IN N. Y

F. L. Willgoose Extends Activities of London Institution to U.S.

WILL BEAR NAME OF CITY

Plans To Leave Forest City in August for the Metropolis.

The usual order has been to establish a Canadian branch of an American institution, commercial or otherwise, on Dominion soil. Principal F. Willgoose of the London Conservatory of Music proposes to reverse all this in establishing an American branch of the London Conservatory of Music in New York city, the muscal metropolis of America.

Further, the branch will retain its name and help to place London, Western Ontario still more prominently on the map of the world as an ducational centre.

The story behind the ambitious enerprise is the fact that there is no such system of local centres for examination purposes connected with musical institutions in the United States, as is known in Canada and with relation to the London Conser-


