Montreal, Dec. 21.—The November statement of operating results issued by the Canadian National Railways today shows \$4,581,418 net earnings, an increase of 135 per cent over the net for November of last year.

Gross earnings for the system amounted to \$24,209,223, or \$689,-579 over November, 1922. Total expenses for the month were \$19,627,905, or \$1,942,630 less than November, 1922, due to mild weather.

The net earnings for the Canadian National Railways for the 11 months ending Nov. 30, 1923, were \$16,602,603, as compared with \$5,-172.116 for the corresponding period

172,116 for the corresponding period of last year, an increase of \$10,-830,487, or 188 per cent.
