

"Wossa" Starts Three Groups Off In Second Campaign For Soccer Title

Windsor Group Given Bye In Play-Offs This Season

Windsor C. I. Won Title Last Year From London South.

TOWNS ARE ADDED

Soccer under "Wossa" auspices is not losing ground, but rather gaining, and this second season of the game promises some fine competition.

Three groups have been formed from the teams entered. There is a city of London group and a Border Cities group and a group to the east composed of Woodstock, College, St. Marys and Simcoe. Each group will have to have its champions declared by Oct. 25 when the play-offs will be commenced.

The winners of the London group will play off in the first round, according to the draw, with the champions of the eastern group the winners meeting the border champions in the final.

Last year London South, which won the local group, got a bye, and played with Windsor, losing the title only after a close and exciting series.

The London group is composed of the following: East C. I., South C. I. and Technical school.

The Windsor group has three schools, Windsor C. I., last year's champions, Walkerville C. I. and Windsor-Walkerville Technical school.

Oct. 17—East vs. South at Thames park.

Oct. 20—Tech vs. South at Thames park.

Oct. 22—East vs. Tech at Queen's park.

BASEBALL PROBE NO DROPPED VET

Scandal Investigation Still Being Conducted, Declares Judge Landis.

Associated Press Despatch. New York, Oct. 14.—Sparks from the bomb thrown into baseball by the suspension of Cozy Dolan and Jimmy O'Connell for attempted bribery will probably be stamped out separately and with deliberation during the winter by Commissioner Landis.

"The investigation is still being conducted," Judge Landis said last night when leaving here for Chicago. "I won't say whether or not I'm satisfied with how far I've gone already."

Other trails broken during exploration of the Dolan-O'Connell exposure, which may be followed by the commissioner, include charges made by Barney Hanson, Bartley Drayfus and "Red" Doolin, a former catcher.

Johnston's allegation went back into the winter of 1923, when he asserted that Lou Criger, a catcher, had been approached by Dolan of tampering with "Pie" Traynor, Pirate third baseman. Dolan alleged that a former catcher of the Giants had offered him a \$40,000 bribe.

Johnston and Drayfus have threatened to force an investigation to the separate threads, and many well-known sports writers are keeping complete inquiry for the good of the game.
