THE VOLUNTEER ORGANIST

Modern stage realism is admitted to have reached the acme of perfection. There is not an invention known to the art of the stage carpenter that has not been introduced at our play houses, and in these days of scenic production anything novel in the way of effect is certain to command immediate attention. When William B. Gray, the well-known playwright, wrote the popular pastoral drama, "The Volunteer Organist," which is to be produced at the Berlin Opera House, Friday, January 15th, he had one ambition in view outside of making his play appeal to all classes of theatre-goers, and that was to have the scenic end of it as up-to-date as possible. In the third act of Mr. Gray's play, there is a church scene which had been pronounced by able critics as being the most absorbing part of an exceptionally interesting play. In fact, this scene has been made so true and real that as soon as the curtain rises on it is immediately transferred into the realm of all that is holy.

THE RETURN OF UNCLE TOM'S CABIN.

One of the prettiest and truest-to-nature stage pictures ever created in the cotton picking scene in the ever popular production of Stetson's "Uncle Tom's Cabin," which is to be seen next Wednesday in the Berlin Opera House. It is a true life-size of an ideal home on the Red River, the setting having been constructed and painted from actual photographs, secured by Manager Leon Washburn. Mr. Washburn is most exacting, even in the minor details of a production. Where another manager would have contented with paper mache plants, Manager Washburn must have the real article. He engaged the services of a chemist who finally produced a shiloh by the use of which the cotton plant may be preserved in its natural state indefinitely. The several hundred plants used in the Stetson production are exactly as they were when removed from a Louisiana plantation in the height of the cotton picking season. Words uttered here in even faintly depicting this beautiful picture. It must be seen to be appreciated.
