

SEVEN ESCAPE DEATH

Women in Dire Peril in Burning Launch at Brockville.

Ignition of Gasoline in Motor-Boat in "Swift Water" Forces Occupants to Jump into River and Swim Ashore - Seven-Year-Old Boy Is Among Those Who Escape Drowning by His Ability to Swim.

Brockville, June 25.—A marine disaster involving the lives of seven persons was narrowly averted on the St. Lawrence, a short distance from Brockville, yesterday afternoon in the "Swift Water," one of the most dangerous places between here and Gananoque.

The launch Argo, recently finished by a local firm for C. W. McLean, son-in-law of Mrs. Senator Fulford, had set out for a short cruise. In the boat with Mrs. McLean were Mrs. McLean, Master George T. Fulford, Miss Fanny Sherriff and B. R. Sherriff, Brockville, and Miss Vaux of Toronto, and the builder, Fred Gilbert, and Bert Fraser. The Argo was only launched last week, and was a very trim craft, but is now a total loss, partly because of a broken propeller and partly because of a broken rudder.

The launch drifted to Bayview, near H. S. Brown's boat house, the fire having melted the spider in the tank, allowing thirty gallons of gasoline to leak out and burn.
