BEAVERS GOT 2 OUT OF 3

Shut out London in Saturday's Game

London June 30--A Mint League baseball game which should have ended 1 to 0 in favor of the Teumseh, went as a victory for Kitchener instead by 3 to 0 at Teumseh Park on Saturday afternoon before 1,600 fans.

The visitors were presented by three runs, being the result of misdirected throws by players Hagel, Milligan and Mitchell. With the bases full and one out in the third Kitchener was enabled to count two runners when Hagel tossed low and to one side of the plate when Harrison hit a bouncer to him, the ball rolling to the stand. Kitchener's third and last run was secured in the next inning when Henrion gave Kyle his base on balls. Kyle stole second and went on to third on Milligan's throw which rolled to Kitchell in center field. Mitchell's return to Pittenger was poor and Kyle kept right on home.

But for these three slips on the part of pitcher Henrion's support and the fact that Pittenger was caught off second after doubling in the eighth, the game as a pretty contest as has been staged at the baseball resort this summer. Had Pittenger remained safe at second the locals would have scored as two more hits followed that of Pittenger's and no telling how many more, as Gilbert wavered at this juncture.

Each Allow Four Hits. The game however vindicated pitcher Ben Gilbert who like Henrion, London's newest addition of its hurling department, allowed but four hits.

Henrion, a softball artist, was perhaps the cause of the poor throws which resulted in his own undoing as a saliva covered ball is difficult to throw accurately, especially when the play has to be hurried. Not a single run was earned and but for Henrion's wildness in the early rounds the story might have been differently told.

The ire of the fans was again raised at several of Umpire Burke's decisions which, given properly might have enabled the locals to win.
