DEARTH OF LABOR.

Copy of Memorial on Subject Forwarded to Victoria Board of Trade

At a meeting of the Vancouver Board

dressed to the Dominion and Frovincial governments, and the letter read as follows:

"The Secretary of the Board of Trade, Victoria, B. C.:

"Dear Sir—Whereas, the question of the dearth of suitable labor for many industries and for domestic help throughout British Columbia, and the consequent serious effect in retarding the influx of capital and the development of our province, having been discussed by the Vancouver Board of Trade at its monthly meetings of the 9th of October and the 6th of November, it was resolved that a memorial be addressed to the Dominion and Provincial governments calling their attention to the matter as being urgent, and praying that steps may be taken to induce and facilitate suitable immigration, it being further resolved that copies of the memorial be circulated to the boards of trade and other representative bodies throughout the province, soliciting their co-operation and active support by having the same signed as widely as possible.

"In accordance with the foregoing, I beg to hand you the enciosed copy for the consideration of your body, and to state that this board will, at the same time, be glad to receive any particulars as to the special labor requirements of your district and any data or suggestions bearing upon the subject.

"One factor may be referred to as adverse to British Columbia, via, that the special immigration rates of transport from Europe extend only to Calgary, points, further west being disproportionately much higher, to obtain a change in which an effort should be made.

"Anticipating your favorable support, it is requested that the memorial
