### Serious Accident to Brooke Farmer

Alvinston, Feb. 2.—Mr. John Kincaid, a farmer aged about 60, and living three miles north of here, is in a very serious condition at present with chances of recovery slight. While Mr. Kincaid was closing his barn door on Saturday afternoon during a fierce windstorm the door forced him off the bridge to the barn,

throwing him a distance of eight feet to the ground. Unable to move he lay in the snow for over half an hour before his wife found him. She immediately telephoned Dr. Martyn, who had him removed to his house. Mr. Kincaid is completely paralyzed from the shoulders down and at present writing is developing pneumonia.

### WATFORD COUNCIL.

Watford, February 2nd, 1914.  
Regular meeting of Council, present, reeve and councillors. Minutes of former meetings read confirmed.  
Chas. Potter, B. A., addressed the council on behalf of a citizen's committee asking to have curfew bell rung and to leave the law enforced in respect to use of cigarettes and tobacco by children under the age of sixteen years, and to regulate the sale of same, and respecting liquor sold to minors.  
Brown—McKercher, that we receive auditors' report and clerk have usual number of copies printed.—Carried.  
Hawn—McKercher, that we request Mr. J. E. Armstrong, our member for East Lambton, to confer with Railway Board in respect to retaining of train service from Sarnia to London of the train formerly due here at 7.45 a. m., as citizens and surrounding country find much inconvenience by reason of it being discontinued, leaving Watford without train service east from 5.16 p. m. until 11 a. m., being 18 hours without service east. That a copy of this resolution be sent to Mr. Armstrong.—Carried.  
Brown—Stapleford, that council receive communication of Municipal Franchise Referendum Committee and express their desire that municipal franchise be extended to married women owning property.—Carried.  
Hawn—Doan, that we grant Children's Aid Society of Lambton County ten dollars towards furthering their work.—Carried.  
McKercher—Brown, that we accept the tender of Nichol McNece for town hall lot at one hundred dollars, and that we accept the tender of Wm. Marwick for brick and wood in lockup at seventy-five dollars.—Carried.  
McKercher—Hawn, that Messrs. Brown, Doan and Stapleford be a committee to confer with Public Library and Women's Institute Committees to discuss and arrange in respect to Rest Room and report at next meeting.—Carried.  
Stapleford—Hawn, that Messrs. Doan and Brown be committee to wait on parties who tendered for lot and lockup, with power to act.—Carried.  
McKercher—Doan, that we accept tender of Nelson Chatterton for village constable at salary of \$480.00 per annum.—Carried.  
Hawn—Brown, that By-law No. 2 to authorize the borrowing of monies for current expenditure be read first time.—Carried, and By-law read.  
Doan—McKercher, that By-law No. 2 be read second time and filled in with amount required, eight thousand dollars.—Carried, and By-law filled in.  
Brown—McKercher, that By-law No. 2 be read third time and passed.—Carried, and By-law read and passed.  
Brown—McKercher, that council comply with request of citizens' committee to enforce the law respecting the use of cigarettes, tobacco and spirituous liquors by minors, and that printing committee have a number of copies of the Act governing same printed for distribution.—Carried.
