CAR COLLIDES WITH POST

A telephone pole on Granville St. at the head of Queen, was cracked up and down several feet nearly broken in two and torn from its moorings on Monday afternoon when a car driven by N. T. Johnston of Massachusetts collided with it. The car, a Ford, was damaged somewhat, the windshield broken and the radiator somewhat badly done up but it was able to proceed to the garage for repairs. Johnston was uninjured but his wife was hurt about the forehead through a bump received when the collision took place.

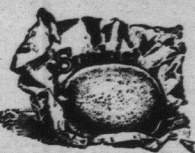
At the time of the accident Mr. and Mrs. Johnston, Indians from Massachusetts, were homeward bound after motoring from the U. S. around and down to Annapolis and were proceeding at a low rate of speed up Granville Street. At the time Joseph Edwards was travelling up Queen Street in his motor truck and rounded the silent policeman just ahead of the Johnston party who, to avoid the truck, swerved to the left, striking the post with above results.

Fredericton, N. B.—Up to Thursday night the receipts from motor vehicles license, etc., of New Brunswick were \$230,000. Hon. P. J. Veniot expects that by the end of the fiscal year, October 31st, they will at least meet his estimate of \$300,000. At the present time receipts are within \$4,000 of the total for 1921. The minister estimated the cars and trucks registered in the Province at about 15,000, exclusive of motor cycles, which number some 250. The buying of cars by the people of New Brunswick keeps up. When the surtax went on there was a lull, but a recovery soon set in.
