Trade continues dult in all branches of business; the markets are devold of speculative feeling, and transactions are measured by the consumptive demand. Hour remains steady. Dealers persist In neglecting the market, and but a single sale is reported to day on 'Change. . heat is dull and heavy. A few sellers make their appearance, but there are no buyers. The bright prospects of the new crop exercises a depressing influence upon the markets, and buyers will only offer terms that no one will accept. In the wool market there is little doing, and prices are rather weaker. Pro visions are inactive. The latest New York quotations report the receipts there rather more liberal, but the quality of the stock coining forward rather inferior. Eutter shows the effect of the recent warm weather, and will not bring full market quotations.

The price of Hides has advanced considerably in this market in
