



The rubber business in common with all other lines feels the paralyzing effects of the anarchist strikes and rioting in connection with the railroad troubles. Of course these troubles cannot long continue but no one can tell to what extent the destruction will go before the common sense of the people asserts itself and the rule of law is restored.
