MR. MORIN WAS BORN IN 1930 AND OBTAINED HIS B.A. AT THE UNIVERSITY OF PARIS, HIS M.A. AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MONTREAL, HIS BACHELOR OF CIVIL LAW AND MASTER OF LAWS DEGREES AT MCGILL UNIVERSITY, AND A DIPLOMA IN INTERNATIONAL LAW AT CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY. HE IS A MEMBER OF THE BAR OF THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC AND PRACTISED LAW IN MONTREAL. HE IS NOW ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF INTERNATIONAL LAW AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MONTREAL, WHERE HE LECTURES ON INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS. MR. MORIN ALSO BELONGS TO THE INTERNATIONAL LAW ASSOCIATION, THE AMERICAN SOCIETY OF INTERNATIONAL LAW AND THE INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION OF JURISTS (THE HAGUE).

MESSRS. MCKAY AND MORIN WERE AWARDED THE FELLOWSHIPS WITH TEN OTHER SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES FROM VARIOUS NATO COUNTRIES, SELECTED BY THE COMMITTEE FOR NORTH ATLANTIC STUDIES WHICH MET AT NATO HEADQUARTERS IN PARIS ON JUNE 11TH AND 12TH UNDER THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF AMBASSADOR ANDRE DE STAERCKE, PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF BELGIUM TO NATO. THE AWARDS WERE MADE FROM LISTS OF CANDIDATES SUBMITTED BY NATIONAL SELECTION COMMITTEES TOTALLING 69 NAMES.

THE PURPOSE OF THE FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME IS TO PROMOTE STUDY AND RESEARCH LEADING TO PUBLICATION ON VARIOUS ASPECTS OF THE COMMON INTERESTS, TRADITIONS AND OUTLOOK OF THE COUNTRIES OF THE NORTH ATLANTIC ALLIANCE, IN ORDER TO THROW LIGHT ON THE HISTORY, PRESENT STATUS, AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENT OF THE CONCEPT OF THE ATLANTIC COMMUNITY, AND THE PROBLEMS WHICH CONFRONT IT.
