Member that the new T-1 forms that were sent out this year allow for the legislation that is now before the House. I may also remind him that this legislation provides for a new income averaging formula that takes into account the taxpayer's income over the last few years. By indicating last year's income on the form, we are making it easier for the taxpayer who wishes to take advantage of the new income averaging formula in the future, so that he knows what amount he declared as income on his previous return.

As far as the social insurance number is concerned, the Hon. Member knows full well that for practical reasons, the use of computers in processing tax returns is increasing more and more, to prevent any mixups or mistakes and to keep the taxpayer's file up-to-date.

Mr. Reid (Kenora-Rainy River): —together with our social insurance numbers. That is an enormous invasion of the privacy of every Canadian. Having anticipated the legislation, having broken the Protection of Privacy Act, will the Minister take steps to change this, to remove it from the projected law, and make sure that whatever is done in this field is done for the convenience of Canadians and not for the convenience of his bureaucrats?

Member knows at what stage the Bill is now. As for using the social insurance number and indicating the taxpayer's income for the previous year on the tax form, we are doing this and we are providing that information to help the taxpayer get the best possible

And, if he is concerned, why does he allow this to happen?

Hon. Pierre Bussières (Minister of National Revenue): Madam Speaker, I am just as concerned as the Hon. Member about the confidentiality of the information given on an income tax return. I would like to point out that the T-1 form sent to the taxpayer is sent to his home and bears his name and address. A continuous procedure is used, based on the social insurance number, in order to ensure that the information on the form goes to the person concerned, since he is the one who receives his personalized form. As I said earlier to the Member for Kenora-Rainy River, we are providing information on the amount to enable the person concerned to use to better advantage the provisions of the Income Tax Act, including the new income averaging formula which taxpayers will be able to use this year.

PROPOSAL TO PAY RENT ACCORDING TO INCOME—USE OF TAX RETURNS

Mr. John Gamble (York North): Madam Speaker, a short time ago the Minister of Public Works suggested it would be appropriate if tenants across Canada paid a fixed amount of 25 per cent to 30 per cent of their income for rent. This has no connection with the amount printed on the T-1 forms which is directly related to the new income averaging
