

**VET. STUDENTS
AGAIN PROTEST**

Walked Out of Class Room
During Dr. Saunders
Lecture.

INVESTIGATION ASKED

Dr. Grange Says He Would
Welcome One-Petition
to Minister.

Protesting against the alleged inhuman methods which they claim were followed in connection with an operation on a horse in a clinic, the members of the third year class of the Ontario Veterinary College walked out of the class-room and declared their intention of remaining out until a competent lecturer had been provided for the work in clinics. The second year has also expressed its disapproval and has gone out on strike. Principal Grange criticized the attitude taken by the students, but says that matters will be satisfactorily adjusted without further trouble. The students, however, have been told of, and would be welcomed by the head of the college.

As to whether charges had been laid against Dr. Saunders for neglecting to give an anesthetic to a horse which was being operated on, the principal said that he had not heard anything of the sort. Dr. Saunders was, he said, a most efficient lecturer and was a gold medalist in his particular line. Besides this he was the author of an authorized text-book on clinics.

There is no doubt that friction has been caused by the resignation of Dr. Fowler, but the principal explained that this lecturer had been engaged to deal with certain subjects, and that it was because he wanted to lecture on other subjects that he resigned. A petition has been sent to the minister of agriculture by the students asking that an investigation be held. It is not likely that much attention will be paid to it, however, if it is of the same tenor as the one which was sent to Principal Grange. The petition merely asked that Dr. Fowler be re-engaged, as he was one of the best lecturers they ever knew.

**SITUATION HURTS
LEECH'S PROPERTY**

Church on One Side, Hospital
on Other, Have Bad
Influence.

There were about fifteen appellants from Hayden street before the court of revision yesterday protesting against the increase of \$25 per foot in their assessment. They claimed that there was a big stable and garage on the corner, and that the street was used as a testing ground for automobiles and horses. The court decided to reduce the assessment \$20 per foot. As the Queen City Curling Club on Hayden street is not paying dividends and the city has entered into competition with them by establishing free bowling greens in the summer, the assessment on the club was reduced \$20 per foot.

Hans Schmitt, slayer of Anna Amiel, was sentenced today to serve seven years and six months in the federal prison at Atlanta for having in his possession a complete outfit for the production of counterfeit \$20 bills. Muret was convicted yesterday.

**PRESIDENT AND DIRECTOR
AT VARIANCE OVER POLICY**

"Had I Been Home, the Canada
Provident Would Not Have Gone Thru," Says Symons—Over Six
Hundred Thousand Dollars Traced to Worthless Loans.

Two things of vital interest to British and Canadian investors in the Union Life Assurance Company have been ascertained from the evidence in the government investigation before Referee Kappeler yesterday. Out of the \$785,000 gathered from the British flotation, \$620,000 was traced to a hole in the ground. The loans in which it was swallowed were worthless. Their method of disappearance savors of a daring railroading process engineered by one or two minds acting apart from the directors.

The second inference advanced was that H. Pollman Evans, the president, was responsible for engineering the disastrous transactions against the judgment of some of his associates. The practice was continued until the crash came. Evans on Stand. On the resumption of the hearing on Nov. 17 Mr. Evans is expected to explain the working out of the policy and to explain the tremendous losses. Harry Symons, K.C., at yesterday's hearing hinted that Mr. Evans could give some interesting enlightenment. Mr. Symons stated that friction had occurred between himself and the president. His own intention was to consolidate the company basis instead of reaching out for new control. His plan had been to have Evans, at several occasions and his attempts to negotiate well-established loans had been cancelled during his absence, by telegrams from Mr. Evans. Further, an entry which he as secretary had made in the books calling for security of "fully paid stock" had been caused and the word "stock" substituted. **PASS BOOK SAVES
FATAL ACCIDENT**

R. H. Clarke of Bobcaygeon
Severely Wounded by a
Companion's Shotgun.

LINDSAY, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Word comes from Bobcaygeon of a serious shooting accident, whereby R. H. Clarke, electrician at the "Little Bob" powerhouse, was severely injured. It is learned that a young man named Hudson, who hails from Orlia, and who is visiting at Mr. Clarke's, noticed a bird close by, and while drawing his shotgun quickly to his shoulder the weapon discharged. The shot entered Clarke's side, tearing a gash four inches deep. Clarke and Hudson succeeded in taking out a large number of shot, while the physician who was called to the scene, and who is now in the hospital, is quite serious, and but for a pass book, which Clarke carried in his pocket, might have proved fatal.

BIG PROFITS, QUICK RETURNS

BOSTON, Oct. 29.—(Can. Press.)—How a net profit of \$24,000 was made on a capital of \$10,000 in four years in the small loan business was told on the witness stand today in the trial of a company on the charge of violating the Small Loans Act. Miss Helen M. Foster of Winthrop testified that four years ago she was engaged by mail to transact the company's loan business in this city and received \$1000 as capital. Since then she has sent back \$24,000 to the Chicago heads of the company, she said.

NOME IS POVERTY STRICKEN

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 29.—(Can. Press.)—The mayor of Nome, Alaska, a cablegram today to the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, said many people were destitute as a result of the recent storm that destroyed part of the city and would need financial aid or transportation. He said that \$50,000 would be required to carry Nome thru the winter and asked for government assistance.
