Mr. Hall stated that he expected the addition to the school to be completed in two months' time, and that the accommodation would provide room for further development.

At the close of the proceedings the meeting was addressed briefly by Councillor Wm. M. Graham in support of his candidacy as third deputy reeve of York Township, and by C. McKay of Forest Hill as candidates for council.

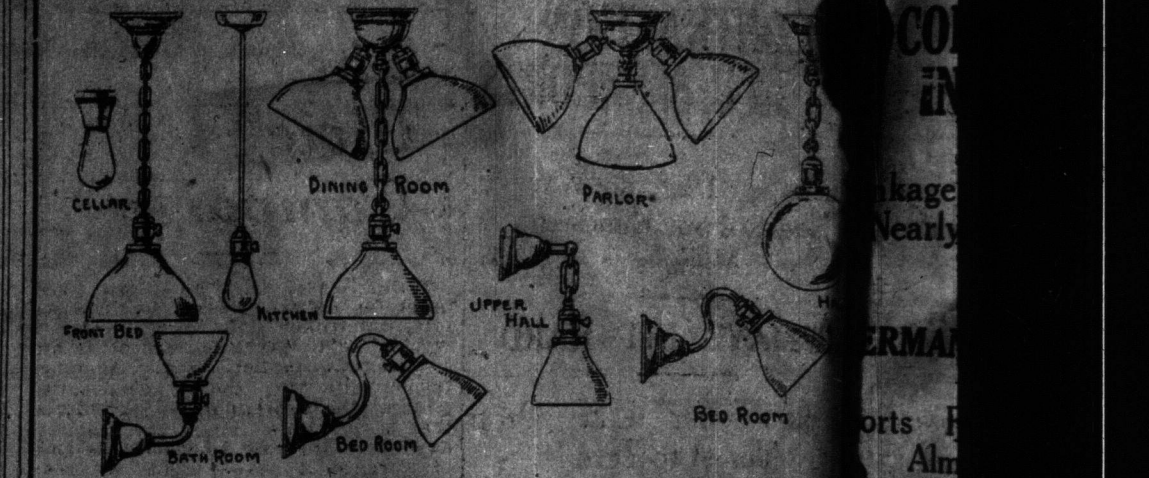
