PROTECTION FROM FIRE

This Was Illustrated Recently at Thomas Edison Plant, Says Lecturer.

"No type of building is fireproof when it is filled with combustible materials and unprotected by automatic sprinklers," declared C. G. Sherman during a lecture delivered before the members of the Central Railway and Engineering Club at the Caris-Rite hotel last evening. "The recent fire at the Thos Edison plant in New Jersey," he said, "while illustrating the real protective value of concrete buildings against fire, also showed the failure of reinforced concrete to afford complete protection.

Intense heat from the burning contents so seriously attacked the supporting columns in one building that a part of two floors collapsed.

LAUNDRYMEN'S PETITION COUPON.

Massacres and Wholesal Burning of Villages Are Reported.

NEW YORK, March 23.—The Per-ian war relief committee with headquarters in this city today received the following cablegram from Tiflis, Rus-

"All villages burned except three Two Christian quarters of Urumian plundered and a great many people killed. Women taken captives. Fitteen thousand refugees in the American mission. Great danger.

"The French mission has been destroyed. There are 10,000 refugees in Russia."

WANT SUBSIDY FOR HYDRO-ELECTRIC RY.

Railway officials are anticipating an extra rush at the Union Station on Friday, as 2500 mayors, aldermen, reeves and councillors from western and central Ontario are coming to Toronto to urge Premier Hearst to subsidize the hydro-electris radial lines. The invasion has been encouraged by the railways, who have offered a return rate of single fare plus 25 cents.

Supt. J. T. Arundel of the C. P. R. has had 1000 men apply for a place on the second contingent. Five hundred were accepted and will leave soon for France, where they will do railway construction work.
