THIRTY-FIVE RECRUITS ENROLLED AT BERLIN

Enlistment Will Be Continued, Aim Being to Secure Two Hundred Soldiers.

Special to The Toronto World. BERLIN, Sept. 6.—Thirty-five men having enlisted overseas during the first brigade Tuesday evening to join the 71st Battalion at London. Recruits will continue being recruited here five sergeants of the 168th Regiment were sent by the office here to their fountain pens. They were Sergt. Woodrow, Gillespie, Russell, Kilby and Wm. Martin is confident that 300 men could be recruited here in the same manner. The number would be increased by the enlistment of 200 men over 21 years of age and unmarried.

MOUNTED RIFLES REACH ENGLAND IN SAFETY

Steamship Elie Carried Reinforcements Thru War Zone Without Mishap.

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.—It is officially announced that the steamship Elie, which sailed from Canada on Aug. 3, has arrived in England. On board were mounted rifle reinforcements, consisting of ten officers and 264 men from the west and two officers and 50 men from the east. There were also details of three officers and twelve men.
