ANGLICANS PROTEST.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—The Anglican Synod is in session at Calgary, and the educational question of Alberta will come up in the form of the following motion to-morrow:

"Whereas, under the provisions of the act creating Alberta, right is granted to no one specified denomination to establish public schools, apart from other denominations, thus securing absolute right to impart religious instruction during the hours in which such instruction may legally be given:

"And whereas all other denominations, including the Church of England, are compulsorily united in other schools; and altho discretion is given to the trustees of these schools to permit religious instruction to be given, it is impossible for that permission to be granted, with the result that no religious instruction can be given in the state-aided schools except by Roman Catholics;

"And whereas it is unjust that any discrimination of this kind should exist;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that steps should be taken to accord to all denominations full equality in regard to religious instruction in state-aided schools, and that the right of each denomination to impart religious teaching to its own children in such schools should be as absolute as that accorded to any other de-
