Ottawa, March 6.-(Special.)-Mr. Moncrieff led off to-day in the debate on the Remedial Bill. At the outset he referred to the great importance of the question. One of the chief objections raised to the bill yesterday was that t was no good; but, surely, it was the minority in Manitoba that ought to have the say in this matter, and their three representatives in the Legislature had pronounced in favor of the bill. He would be unworthy of being called a Protestant if he held in less esteem a fellow-citizen simply because his religious convictions were not the his religious convictions were not the same as his own. (Hear, hear.) Dr. his religious convictions were not the same as his own. (Hear, hear.) Dr. Sproule yesterday had said he was opposed to Separate Schools. and that was the reason he opposed this bill. It that was a reason why, then he pitted the doctor's intelligence. His mind had evidently not thoroughly grasped the position of affairs. This was not a question of Separate Schools—it was the redressing of the grievances of the Catholie minority of Manitoba. Dr. Sproule was following the lead of Mr. McCarthy. That gentleman had led the House astray before, and if he was not watched he would do so again. (Hear, hear.) He believed Mr. McCarthy was responsible largely for the present agitation; seemingly he held a brief to keep agitation alive. The Toronto World now supported that gentleman, but only a few months ago that paper designated Mr. McCarthy as a strife-maker.
