MR. HARDY'S OPPORTUNITY.
Mr. Hardy, the new Ontario Premier, has a fine opportunity before him. He has not the political strength of Sir Oliver Mowat in Ontario, but, to offset this, he is not handicapped by the reputation for fossilism which Sir Oliver worthily sustained for many years. If the new Premier will give us really progressive government, with a policy that makes for economy in the machinery of administration, while generously encouraging every movement which will give the province a direct return for its money, his reign in the land will be long. But a continuance of the Mowat regime under the name of Hardy cannot last. The taxpayers are sick to death of heavy provincial expenditures in order that one set of politicians with their side-ers and their cousins and their aunts, may fatten at the public crib. Sir Oliver could maintain that system, but Mr. Hardy will fail. Three officials doing the work of one; the revenue of the municipalities tapped to provide provincial funds; timber lands auctioned off to fill up a yearly deficit; all luxuries of the past. Sir Oliver could prove that they were all evidences of Christianity; that sturdy little gentleman took the recipe for gulling the public to his new Ottawa home, and his successor will have to get along without it.

THE DROWNING SEASON.
As a life-destroyer whisky is not in the competition with plain every-day water just now. It is a strange thing that people who go boating, fishing or boating in summer seem to leave their common sense behind them. Many escape. A goodly number, unfortunately, lose their lives. The rules that reduce fatalities to a minimum are so simple that persons of the most uneducated should be able to act on them. To venture into deep water, unless you are a good swimmer, is not added to cramps, is madness. Boating, either with the sail or the oar, is always a dangerous game. Unless the person in command thoroughly understands how to manage a boat, and, in charge of a party, has proper control over them. Yet people who have about as much experience of boating as a new born infant continue to venture on the water in all weathers, and the newspapers continue to record disasters. The schools are so busy filling children's brains with dogma that the young-sters have little time left for learning the elementary facts of how to take care of themselves in presence of physical danger. As long as such conditions prevail drowning accidents will take place, and anguish, misfortune and death brought into many happy families.

A candidate who cannot tell us what he will do on the principal issues of the day? The Conservatives of the riding have shown sense and spirit in putting up Mr. McLaughlin again.
