## ABOUT THE WAR CLOUD

Nothing of Startling Import Has Occurred Chas Yesterday, But Both Britain and France Are Going on War Preparations-Stock Markets Were Depressed Yests, lay and Wheat Took an Upward Bound-France Still Shows Stubbornness in Regard to Fashoda.

The British Admiralty has ordered the reserve warships to take stores on board immediately, and the projectile factories at Sheffield are working day and night at high pressure.

The dock-yards at Portsmouth, Devonport and Chatham have each received instructions to prepare six 30-knot torpedo boat destroyers for commissioning so that they will be able to put to sea in 24 hours.

Overtime has been ordered to be begun on the first-class cruisers Europa and Andromeda, so as to hurry them for sea service. Financial circles in London do not regard the political situation as

serious, yet there was a decided slump in securities yesterday.

A rumor was current in London yesterday that the British Government has secured the principal vessels of the Cunard and White Star lines as auxiliary cruisers.

It is stated that the British North American squadron has been notified to mobilize at Halifax. The French newspapers warmly endorse the position of M. Delcasse,
