

WHAT DEVONSHIRE SAYS. This War Will Mean a Big Thing for the British Col-

onies. shire, Lord President of the Council of Ministers, speaking in the city this evening, congratulated the country upon the fact that despite the diversity of political opinion there was only one voice regarding the duty of the Government to prosecute the war.

"The longer and more arduous the struggle becomes," said His Grace, "the more naved should be our determination never again to let our African colonies bear the suffering and loss which they are now experiencing."

He deprecated criticisms on British commanders in the field, and, in dilating upon the attitude of foreign nations, he said he thought too much attention had been paid to the comments of foreign newspapers, especially in view of the fact that the attitude of every power had been strictly correct.

WAS KILLED AT ELANDSLAAGTE. Robert Buchanan Was a Member of the 48th Highlanders and

the 48th Highlanders and of "C" Company.

Mr. James Buchanan of this city has just received word from Glasgow of the death of his brother. Robert Buchanan, at the battle of Elandslaagte. The deceased and his brother James joined the 48th Highlanders at the formation of the regiment, and served four years in C company, under Capt. Currie. The deceased subsequently joined the Royal Canadian Dragoons, and left that regiment in May last, returning to Scotland, where he enlisted in the Gordon Highlanders in C company of that regiment. His uncle, James B. Buchanan, was captain of this company of the Gordons, and had two sons under him in the same regiment, one a sergeant, another a corporal. The four Ruchanans were killed at Elandslaagte. The dead body of the captain was found near the top of Talana Hill, with the bodies of his two sons lying across his. They had apparently rushed to his assistance when he was hit, leading the company, and the three were shot down. The deceased's body was found near the Boer laager, he having apparently gone on with the company, and was shot down just as the victory was won, no doubt by one of the cowardly volleys fired by the Boers after they had raised the white fiag. Deceased was a very popular member of C company, 48th Highlanders, and his death will be regretted by many of the old members of the company. This is the second ex-member of C company that has died in action during the past two years. The first was Pte. Oldbury, who was the first company bugler, and was killed in action at the battle of Omdurman.
