Brodrick, Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, speaking this evening at Thorncombe, said the situation in China was considerably involved, because the country here is the country here. "Great Britain," continued the Under Secretary, "while prepared to support the loyal viceroys of Southern China. who have stood aloof from this insurrection, and while prepared also to preserve British trade with China, will claim some penaity or indemnity for the damage wrought.

"Nevertheless, we cannot undertake to govern China ourselves or with the assistance of other powers."
