### Occupy the Streets To-Day-One Man Dying and Thirty Injured as the Result of One Day's

### Turmoil-Traction Company Determined to Persist in Its Running.

Albany, May 14 .- A thousand national guardsmen, and a hundred mounted men will occupy Albany streets to-morrow and attempt to force a riotous crowd to let the cars of the United Traction Company run with nonunion men. The 23rd Regiment of Brooklyn, the 10th Battalion of Albany and the Third Signal

Corps will make up the complement of men. They will be reinforced by 200 special deputies, 300 policemen and over 100 Pinkerton detectives. It is feared that the bloodshed and the riotous scenes of to-day will be repeated with much greater fatality, for the mobs about the car

The results of to-day are. One man dying, fully 20 or 30 injured, 80 men out of 150 brought here by the company, induced to desert, the trolley lines cut, cars demolished and the police almost powerless to control the thousands of men patrolling the streets.

The company, howeer, insists it will run its cars with other men, and it is said late to-night
