FATAL STRIKE RIOTING. London, May 6.—A despatch from St. Petersburg, dated yesterday, says a riot occurred on Monday in connection with the strike of seamen of Kronstadt. Infantry was called out, and clashes with the strikers, two hundred and sixty-two persons were injured, and three officers of infantry were killed.

If he accepts the invitation the proposition will be submitted to him, and certain assurances will be given which are believed to be being made to reach Mr. O'Neill.

ILLINOIS CROP BULLETIN.

The Illinois State weekly crop bulletin says: "The average condition of wheat is good, but in many localities it has been damaged by chinch bugs. The weather is too cold for reasonable growth. The crop is practically in the ground, and the season is unfavorable for germination. Plants are coming up unevenly and show signs of distress. Considerable weeding was necessary and average will show a decrease. Plowing for corn was done under difficulty in some districts owing to heavy condition of soil."

A Canadian Pacific bill for extension of Manitoba Central and Manitoba Northwestern was before the Railway Committee this morning. Lash, representing the Canadian Northern, objected that extensions covered the same ground as the projected line of the Canadian Northern, for which plans had been filed. Blair announced that the policy of the government was to extend the line of the Canadian Northern. The object should be to serve needs of territory. Lines of different systems should be a reasonable distance apart, say forty miles. The Manitoba Central bill was passed, with a provision that should not be extended more than 200 miles westward. The Manitoba Northwestern bill aroused vigorous opposition. Mr. Davis complained that deflection of the line would be a serious injury to the settlers along Prince Albert. Further consideration was postponed.
