### AT THE HAGUE

Neutrality During Warfare on Land Under Discussion.

The Hague, July 26. - Speaking today before the committee which is considering the duties of neutral states during warfare on land, Brigadier-General George B. Davis, of the American delegation, declared that the United States associated itself with the French proposal, which sets forth for the acts of its subjects if those acts are committed upon its own territory; that the responsibility of a neutral state is not involved by the fact that some of its subjects take service with a belligerent, and that its subjects aid in exporting arms and ammunition for the use of a belligerent.
