\$1.50 Per Ton—State Has Share on Monopoly.

Berlin, Sept. 26 .- The words "coal famine" are on the lips of many people in all parts of Germany at the present moment, the constant increase in the price of that commodity recently having given rise to the fact that the coming winter will be a hard one penses. for consumers.

Investigation shows the quantity extracted from the mines is greater now than it ever was. Industrial requirements, however, have increased, miners' wages have been raised and exports have augmented, all of which circumstances tend to make prices

Mining companies have not failed to take advantage of the situation, as united action of the companies and the wholesale and retail dealers, who have agreed to sell coal to the public at damage of the two vessels. As the fixed rates, and thus abolish competition, by which the public benefited, will probably result in a further augmentation o mine shareholders' profits.

MR. FOY TO RAILWAYMEN

Who Appealed to Attorney-General Against Prosecutions.

Toronto, Sept. 26.-Headed by Mr. Harvey Hall, a deputation of trainmen waited on Attorney-General Foy, to protest against the action of his department in prosecuting railroadmen held responsible by coroner's juries for accidents.
