HEADQUARTERS TO REMAIN IN CITY

Proposed Move of "F" Unit to Guelph Frowned On

THIS IS GLASS' REPORT

M. P. Wires Trade Board London Remains Head—New Hospital To Start Soon.

Gordon Philip, industrial commissioner and secretary of the board of trade, has received what is tantamount to an official denial of the reports that the headquarters of the "F" Unit, Military Hospital Commission, would be transferred from London to Guelph. The new military hospital has been opened in what was formerly the Ontario prison farm. Following the publication of the reports of the proposed transfer, Mr. Philip telegraphed to S. F. Glass, M. P., at Guelph, that he has received a reply from Mr. Glass assuring him that the headquarters will remain here.

In Mr. Glass' telegram he says that he has been at the headquarters of the Military Hospital Commission and that the change is not favored here.

The text of his reply follows: "Interviewed headquarters. Military Hospital Commission here today. Am authorized to state that proposed move of 'F' Unit headquarters from London to Guelph is not favorably considered. On contrary, London will remain headquarters for Military Hospital Commission. Plans for construction of new hospital on O'Neil estate will be under way."

EX-CZAR'S BROTHER AND UNCLE SENT TO INTERIOR

Petrograd, Sept. 12.—The newspapers here announced today that by order of the Government, Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovich and Paul Alexandrovich have been transferred from their private residence at Gatchina, near Petrograd, to the ministry of the interior.

Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovich is a brother of the deposed emperor. When the imperial regime was overthrown on March 15, Emperor Nicholas designated Grand Duke Michael as regent, but he in turn abdicated on the following day. Last week the former grand duke was arrested in connection with the discovery of a counter-plot. Grand Duke Paul Alexandrovich is an uncle of the former emperor.

CALLS KERENSKY TOO RADICAL TO WELD RUSSIANS

Russian-Canadian Oil Magazine Believes Conservatism Needed.

HIS VIEWPOINT CHANGED

Proper Conception of Slav Republic Only Possible From Distance.

"Russia is a mystery land. One cannot tell what may happen," said Albert McGarvey, a prominent Russian oil magnate, who is now visiting with Joseph Seandrett at 535 Richmond street, after many years' absence in the land that was the czar's. Mr. McGarvey gave The Advertiser an interview on Russian conditions a few weeks ago, and today was asked for his view of the significance of Kerensky's rebellion.

"I cannot say much about it," he replied. "Kerensky is brilliant and all the rest, but he has too much radicalism. He hasn't the confidence of the conservative element. He should have a combination of the two elements. Then things might progress."

"Will the situation be serious for the Allies?" was asked.

"Well, some troops are still holding the front against the Germans," he replied. "There is that much to be said. Tomorrow there may be a new story."

"You know I'm just getting on to the Russian situation now. One has to go to Petrograd or out of the country to find what is going on. I have been in the country for some time, and I know more about Russia since I came home than when I was there. It is a strange land, the Russian."

Mr. McGarvey is having his passport prepared at the Russian consulate in London, Eng. He does not believe he will be able to get through to his oil properties at the present time.

HOLIDAYS SO FEW, BRING REPRIMAND WHEN ASKED FOR

School Trustees Censure the Superintendent For Not Taking More.

RECORD OF FAITHFULNESS

The city council was granted the use of the schools needed to hold the principal elections on October 8th and for meetings during the campaign.

FOUR INJURED WHEN CAR TURNS TURTLE IN SIX-FOOT DITCH

Alvinston Motor Party Cut, Bruised and Shocked Near Hyde Park Today.

James Hild, his son, Ernest, wife and two daughters, all of Alvinston, sustained injuries when the motor car in which they were riding, skidded into a six-foot ditch and turned turtle on Tuesday afternoon.

The father and son were the most severely injured, both being thrown from the car and cut by glass. The car was unable to get out of the ditch, and the driver, Ernest Hild, was bruised and shaken up considerably, and suffered to a great extent from shock.

All were taken to the office of Dr. C. C. Ross of Hyde Park, where their injuries were given attention.

Ernest Hild was driving, and claims that a motorist coming in the opposite direction crowded him so close to the ditch that the car toppled over, and it slid on to the wet grass.

After some repairs to the car all were able to continue their journey to the city.

RUSSIAN MISSION TO WASHINGTON ARRIVES

Lands at Halifax and Proceeds to U. S. A.—Backs Kerensky.

BISHOP FALLON RESORTING TO COURTS, IN LABEL SUIT, FOLLOWING TROUBLE AT FORD

Retains Counsel To Proceed Against Parish Members Whose Open Letter and Charges Are Claimed by Diocesan Head To Be Libellous.

T. J. Murphy, K. C., of the firm of McKillop, Murphy & Gunn has received word from Bishop M. P. Fallon, now at Baltimore, to commence actions for libel against several members of the congregation of Our Lady of the Lake Church at Ford City, Ont., for having made certain statements in a letter handed out for publication on August 26.

Newspapers publishing the letter will not be proceeded against, but the authors of the document will be compelled to answer for their statements in the courts. Thus an ecclesiastical dispute is brought directly into the civil courts, and there is every reason to believe that Bishop Fallon means to exercise his prerogative as a citizen and bring the whole question into the light of day. Charges made in the letter reflected seriously on the integrity of his lordship, and it said that nothing short of an ample apology will do the case.

Names Letter Signers. Those who will be named in the libel action signed the letter, which was issued at a time immediately after the publication of Bishop Fallon's letter in which he announced that the church would be closed unless Father Laurendeau was accepted as the rector. Father Laurendeau is of French descent, and preached in French, and it is said was selected for his peculiar fitness for the Ford City parish. He has apparently been able to control the situation at Ford, as the rioting which broke out Saturday on his appearance appears to have died out. The signers of the letter in question are as follows: Stanislas Janisse, president; Emile LaPanne, first vice-president; Joseph Beauchamp, second vice-president; Adolphe Beauchamp, secretary; Claude Reaume, treasurer.

While details of the bishop's complaint are not available in view of his absence from the city, it is believed that he takes most serious exception to that part of the letter referring to his alleged treatment of several priests.

Said Allowance Unpaid. One paragraph stated: "We cannot help but notice with what promptness you respond to the decrees of the ecclesiastical tribunals of the mother church, which had to award one judgment four times, to awarding an allowance to the late lamented Father St. Cyr, whom you deprived of a parish after he had served his Maker as a pastor of the flock for 20 years, while allowance is still unpaid, we understand."

Another statement referring to the alleged treatment of another priest by his lordship appears as follows: "We have also seen the business of the examination of the development of the church, with which you complied with the repeated decisions of the ecclesiastical courts in the actions instituted against you by Father L. A. Beaudouin, of cherished memory to us, when an award of \$2,000 was entered against you—a claim this congregation shall expect its future pastor to collect from episcopal authority."

Invaded Sanctity of Grave. Further along in the article reference is made to a third priest: "He is also inspired by the business of the examination of the development of the church, with which you complied with the repeated decisions of the ecclesiastical courts in the actions instituted against you by Father L. A. Beaudouin, of cherished memory to us, when an award of \$2,000 was entered against you—a claim this congregation shall expect its future pastor to collect from episcopal authority."

Before the letter closed the bishop is accused of having treated a gentleman's agreement regarding the school situation at Windsor as a "scrap of paper" in "the manner of another exalted personage."

The whole letter is likely to be named in the action and will probably be characterized by the bishop as a chain of mendacious falsehoods. Proceedings are now under way, and with his lordship's return from Baltimore more interesting developments are anticipated.

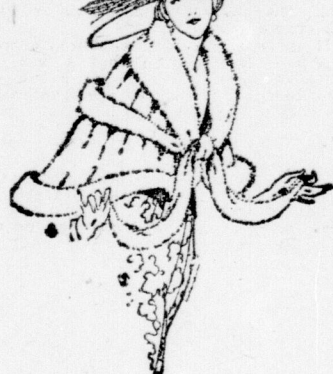

Continued From Page One GERMAN ATTACK

Some front, the British capturing a German trench nearly a quarter of a mile in extent. There were artillery duels in the neighborhood of Ypres, according to the official report from British headquarters in France tonight.

The text of the statement reads: "As a result of local fighting in the neighborhood of Ypres, reported this morning, the Northumberland troops engaged in extending their gains southward a further 400 yards, occupying a German trench. Several prisoners were taken by us; our casualties were light."

Enemy Mown Down

"This morning the enemy attacked our new positions, advancing in close formation, but was driven off by our fire. Later in the day two bombing attacks were made by the enemy from the south against our right flank. We were also repulsed, our troops concentrating the captured trenches."

Artillery activity was particularly marked during the day southeast of Ypres and in the Neuport sector.

"On Monday a thick haze again prevailed, and made work difficult. Despite this, observation was carried out by our artillery, both by airplanes and balloons. During the day our machines destroyed several enemy observation balloons and a number of enemy aircraft. During the night they dropped bombs on the enemy's positions near Courtrai."

Ten Enemy Airplanes.

"In the air fighting yesterday three German airplanes were brought down, seven others were driven down out of control, two of which were brought down or driven down by one pilot. In one case this pilot descended within 50 feet of the ground and set fire to a machine he had brought down. He then regained our line of the line, still flying at 50 feet, although attacked by three hostile machines. Three of our machines are missing."

FRENCH AIRMEN ACTIVE.

PARIS, Sept. 11.—The official communication issued by the war office tonight reads: "There was quite pronounced artillery activity in Belgium, in the sector Cassinette plateau, and on both banks of the Meuse."

"On September 10 three German airplanes were brought down in engagements with our pilots. A fourth enemy machine was destroyed by our special guns."

"In the last 24 hours, in retaliation for the bombardment of our rear zone, our batteries carried out numerous fire both day and night on enemy cantonments, depots and stations, and destroyed or silenced several batteries."

"Our trench artillery rapidly took the upper hand in bomb fighting before Dixmude an enemy patrol was dispersed by one of ours."

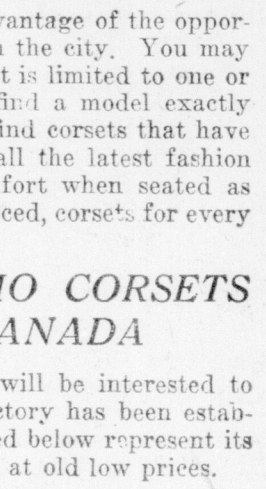
"Our airplanes have carried out in the last two days 75 flights, taken numerous photographs, and engaged in several combats. In addition an enemy airplane was brought down this morning inside our lines and a second airplane was brought down by our special guns near Schorbroek."
