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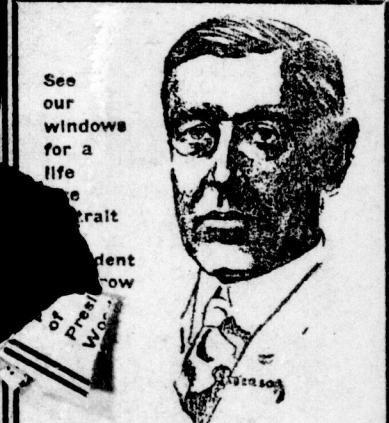
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LILLIAN GISH and HENRY VALTHAER in D.W. GRIFFITH'S "The Great Love" An ARTCRAFT Picture

BOARD OF TRADE IN CITY TO BE RULED IN DEMOCRATIC WAY

New Members Will Have Lots of Influence.

MEMBERSHIP WIDE OPEN

Wonderful Opportunities Here, Says Director of Present Great Drive.

In announcing that a call had gone out for the first meeting of the advisory committee of the expansion and reorganization campaign of the London Board of Trade, J. C. R. Foster, the director of the drive, today said he was more impressed with the opportunity to participate in a worth-while undertaking here than is usual.

"This city has opportunities that are wonderful," he said, "and the men it has been privileged to meet in the early stages of the campaign for a board of trade worthy of the city's rank and importance are just the sort of men with whom it is a pleasure to work."

The advisory committee will meet on Tuesday at noon in the Tecumseh House. Mr. Foster said, "because of the character of this committee. On it are represented every element in this community, all the professions and every class of business."

"This is the best kind of a start we could possibly make. In fact, we could not feel at the outset that every citizen of London interested in the building of a worth-while board of trade, it would not be worth the time these men are giving and are going to give to undertake it."

"The fact that the only criticism I have encountered of the present board of trade is that it has been too small, and that its activities have been in the hands of too few men. The obvious answer to this is that the critics did not become members and then endeavor to correct what they regarded as a fault."

"However that may be, the fact now is that the board is wide open to every citizen of London. In order to emphasize this, the invitation, the thoroughly democratic nature of the expanded and reorganized board ought to be well understood."

The Democratic Way.

"Perhaps one illustration will help to do this. In the modern hot of trade, which is what London will have at the end of this campaign, the members are literally the servants of the members. It is a misnomer to speak of them as the governing body. The new bylaws, so short and simple that no one can misinterpret them, place the government of the body squarely in the hands of the membership. Too much emphasis cannot be placed on this fact in the public mind, for it is the public to which the board is now appealing for interest and co-operation."

"In this connection I would be doing an injustice to the men who have sponsored this campaign if I did not also emphasize the statement that every one of them has gone into the movement because of its democratic appeal. Each one of them feels strongly that the only sort of board of trade he cares to be identified with is that in which the membership as a whole controls. And in order that this control may represent the whole citizenry, the membership rolls are to be thrown wide open to every man and woman in London on an exactly equal footing."

"I am even authorized to make the statement that within a few days the men who now govern the board of trade will make it possible for the new members to assume control from the start."

BACK-KITCHEN FIRE SCARES NEIGHBORS

The roof of the back kitchen at the home of W. C. Court, 2nd concession, near Dorchester, took fire about 1:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon. In an effort to summon aid the central operator at the fire station called the neighbors of the Court family well along the line, and informed them of the fire. Not knowing the extent of the blaze, they hurried to the rescue. On the arrival of several neighbors in cars it was a gasless Sunday, too they quickly extinguished the blaze, which was slight. It is thought the shed ignited from a spark, coming from the chimney of the house.

WORK OF BUILDING UP NEW BOARD OF TRADE MOVES FAST

Swift Strides in Campaign Due to "Fine Spirit" of London Citizens.

Building up the forces for the expansion and reorganization campaign of the London Board of Trade has made great strides for the week the job has been in hand. This, the campaign director says, is due to the "fine spirit" with which everyone here approaches the project.

On the walls of the headquarters at 363 Richmond street are a number of charts and diagrams illustrating the methods to be followed in the rebuilding of the board, and also showing the development of the campaign step by step.

A specially constructed calendar for the dates of the meetings and gatherings in connection with the drive is already far advanced, indicating that the short time before the actual effort to enroll memberships is going to be well filled.

Civic Dinner on October 8. There will be two meetings today, the first that of the Ministerial Alliance at 10:30 in the A. C. A. hall, and the second that of the committee on lists and estimates this evening at 7:30 in the Tecumseh.

Under the name of the Civic dinner, the big event of the preliminary period will be given on the evening of Tuesday, October 8. On Friday of next week, the 11th, the campaign manager will have his whole organization together in the evening.

The "office calendar" shows that numerous other meetings of groups and committees will be of daily occurrence from now on.

Campaign in Outline. Mr. Foster said last night he had been asked by many persons just what was the campaign and the expansion and reorganization that he had prepared a little outline of the whole campaign, under the heading of the relief suggested by the questions. Here it is:

(1) Securing the necessary membership and income for three years.

(2) A carefully compiled list of the citizens of London who might supply such a movement, made in card index form.

(3) The number of memberships that each should carry, based upon the benefits to be expected, and what corporations and men of similar standing in other cities are doing, indicated on cards.

(4) This list to be examined carefully by two separate committees, and passed on by the campaign committee before it is used.

(5) Creating a working membership. (a) During the campaign for memberships and afterwards, a systematic method of acquainting the public with the proper nature of a board of trade to be put into operation.

(6) Appeals to Non-Members. (a) A series of luncheons and meetings which ultimately become schools of organization and written into concrete form. At these gatherings specialists will present the steps necessary in successful organization matters.

(7) The speakers to be aided by charts and other methods of graphic presentation. Everything reduced to a common sense basis and hip-hurrah methods avoided.

(8) This definite and methodical way of presenting a sometimes misunderstood idea of activity fortifies the optimism of a mass of intelligent landmen and smother the pessimist under a mass of carefully collected facts that leave no ground for just criticism of the board of trade.

(9) The development of a program of work. (a) With the completion of the membership and education campaign, the development of a program of work will be the next step.

(b) Each member will be asked to express himself on what he thinks the organization should undertake for the welfare of the city as a whole and for the promotion of his line of work.

(c) The expressions thus received will be collated and written into concrete paragraphs, these forming the planks of the program of work.

(d) This method brings unity of action in the shortest possible time and enables the officers to reach out intelligently to the individual members for support and help.

(e) Special instead of standing committees. (a) Careful analysis of work to be done in the future.

(b) Definite schedule of action, preparation of needed data, limited committee appropriations, conferences between committees and directors at frequent intervals.

(c) Outline of office system: (a) Disbursement sheet and authorization of all expenditures. (b) Budget for proper distribution of expenditures.

(c) Card index for membership record and for proceedings of the directors and committees.

(d) Filing records for commercial, industrial and other information photographs and data for publicity requirements.

FRUIT GROWERS HAVE SOLD CROP

ILBERTON, Sept. 29.—The Ilberton fruit growers have sold their output for the season to a Winnipeg firm, an old customer of the association. Barrels are high in price and hard to get. One car shipped from Dutton on August 15 has not arrived to date. There is a good demand for evaporated stock for the export trade.

WORKING RUSHED ON QUARTERS FOR TROOPS

Over five thousand troops will be wintered in this city this winter, according to information received from headquarters staff.

The troops at Carling Heights will move to Queen's Park about October 31. The Canadian Garrison Regiment has already moved into the building formerly occupied by the 63rd Battery.

The buildings which are being erected at Carling Heights to winter the troops are going up, the men working about 14 hours a day.

ARTILLERY DEPOT FOR MILITARY DISTRICT NO. 1

An artillery depot for Military District No. 1 will be formed shortly and the 63rd and 64th Batteries will be co-located. The artillery depot will be divided into two sections, overseas and permanent sections. The overseas section will be composed entirely of men of category A who are available for draft. The section will have 2 officers, 5 sergeants, 230 gunners, drivers, clerks and signallers, making a total of 237 officers and men.

The permanent section of the artillery depot will be composed of men in lower categories than A. These men will be trained for artillery instructors. The section will be composed of 5 officers, 8 staff sergeants and sergeants, 4 wheelmen and tailors, etc., and 65 gunners, drivers, cooks and clerks, making a total of 82 officers and men. One hundred horses will be secured for the permanent section.

A large portion of the men in the 63rd and 64th Batteries have volunteered for the Tank Battalion. Major K. K. Cameron has been unofficially notified of an appointment with the Tank Battalion. The artillery of Canada will be reorganized and each district will have an artillery depot similar to that of the one in Military District No. 1. It is not known yet who will be in charge of the artillery depot for this district.

MUSHROOM SOCIALS.
GRANTON, Sept. 29.—The mushroom season is on and people of the village are having mushroom and puff-ball socials. Owing to the coolness of the weather mushrooms are now very plentiful.
