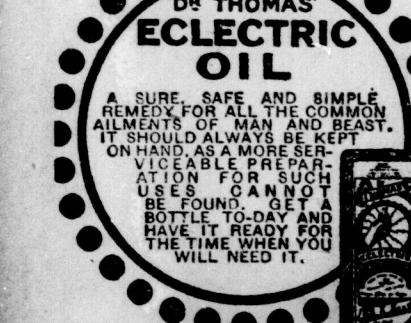

BELL TELEPHONE CO. SCORED BY LAWYER FOR INEQUALITIES

Should Not Charge One Place More Than Another.

OBJECTS TO ANY INCREASE

Company Must Furnish More Specific Data to Railway Board.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—The hearing before the board of railway commissioners in the matter of the application of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada for an increase in tolls, and the matter of the application of the municipal corporation of the cities of Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton, and of the United Canadian Municipalities for an order directing the delivery of particulars by the telephone company, was adjourned this afternoon.

The chief argument today at both the morning and the afternoon sessions was presented by W. J. Hagenah of Chicago, an expert of corporation and financial law and of the methods followed by the various public utilities commissions. In compliance with the order, the applicant company submitted statements. The returns for the years 1913 to 1917 were given. The total expenses from January 1 to September 30, 1918, were shown to be \$7,383,739.25, and the net operating revenues for the same period were \$5,552,552.53.

The total capital liabilities for the above period were shown to be \$29,149,000, and the total current liabilities, \$1,288,266.14. The sale of the company's bonds and debentures to September 30, 1918, was shown to be \$43,200,362.77. The estimated net revenue that would be produced by the proposed 20 per cent increase, according to the statement is \$1,200,000.

The entire discussion during the day was centered upon the information produced by the company. Mr. Hagenah took up each point separately, but was evidently not satisfied with the particulars furnished by the company, especially as regards the method of combining the toll and exchange charges. Mr. Hagenah also scored the inequality of the telephone charges in Canada, whereby one city was charged more than others for its telephone service.

Mr. Henry Drayton requested A. E. Plaine, controller for the Bell Telephone Company, and Mr. L. MacFarlane, solicitor for the company, prepare the statements requested and to try and have them ready by Tuesday next.

St. Marys Nursing Sister Applies For Divorce at Ottawa

Asks Parliament to Hear Case Against New York Man.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—Rose K. Miller, of St. Marys, Ont., will apply to parliament at the approaching sessions for a divorce from her husband, William Price Miller of New York.

ST. MARYS, Nov. 22.—Mrs. Rose K. Miller, who was formerly Miss Doolittle, is well-known here for her family lives. She was married to Mr. Miller about two years ago. She has been serving in France as a nurse, and only recently gave an address in the town hall, following her return from overseas.

FUNERAL OF TORONTO DETECTIVE LARGELY ATTENDED AT CLINTON

CLINTON, Nov. 22.—The remains of Acting Detective Frank Williams of Toronto were laid away today in the Clinton Cemetery. The funeral service was held at the old home of the deceased on the main road between Clinton and Toronto, and was conducted by Rev. W. B. Moulton of Clinton, Anglican Church, where the family resided.

Inspectors Crowe and Kennedy of the Toronto police department, with four other officers of the detective department, were present and acted as pallbearers. They conveyed sympathetic messages from the mayor of Toronto and the police commissioners. It is the general feeling here that by the death of Frank Williams, a brilliant young man has been cut short, for he had advanced rapidly, and was a valuable and reliable officer.

Beautiful floral wreaths were given by the Toronto officers and departments as a tribute of the esteem in which the young officer was held. The funeral was largely attended, as the family is well and favorably known in this district. His father and mother survive, with three sisters and four brothers, all of whom live here.

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Would Hang the Kaiser. "We are asking each other what we should do with the Kaiser," said Governor Cox. Governor Cox, in conclusion, said he believed that Great Britain and the United States would forever maintain the even balance of peace.

POHLMAN SUIT AGAINST HURON AND ERIE LOST

Chief Justice Dismisses Claim for \$10,000 Damages for False Arrest.

PLAINTIFF PAYS COSTS

London's Police Magistrate, Crown Attorney and Two Detectives Witnesses.

[Special to The Advertiser.] HAMILTON, Nov. 22.—Chief Justice Falconbridge dismissed in the local action of E. F. Pohlman against the Huron & Erie Company for \$10,000 damages for false arrest. Pohlman was ordered to pay the costs. Chief Justice Falconbridge took the case from the jury. Shortly after the afternoon session, Justice Falconbridge dismissed the case against the Huron & Erie Company, and S. F. Washington, Hamilton, for Manager W. T. Westby, named as a co-defendant, asked that the action be dismissed. Justice Falconbridge made no comment on the evidence submitted by the plaintiff, and decided the defendants should testify.

Failed to Prove Case. In giving judgment the judge said: "The plaintiff has failed against all defendants to prove prosecution without reason, as is required, the prosecution is founded on reasonable grounds, and dismiss the action with costs. Fifteen days stay."

"Had there been no reason for the prosecution I would not have held the Huron and Erie Company responsible for the actions of Manager Westby." Pohlman had four cases on in court, yesterday's case completing his list.

The first witness called yesterday afternoon was Manager Westby. He, cross-examined, said that the loan company received the \$5, the amount of the forgery, no prosecution would have followed. He was on the stand for about one hour, but no important evidence developed.

Evidence Contradictory. M. M. Ferguson, of McConnell-Ferguson, London, on whose name the check was forged, gave Pohlman a good reputation. Pohlman, when giving evidence, said that he had not access to Mr. Ferguson's desk in the office. Mr. Ferguson denied this in his evidence. Pohlman's evidence, compared with that of the detective, was contradictory.

Detective Harry Down, London, said he got a description of the man who presented the check in question, from Miss McGregor, a clerk in the company's office. He then went to Mr. Ferguson, who told him the description somewhat resembled that of a man, who formerly worked for him, but was now engaged in Hamilton. On a former occasion at London, Pohlman was arrested here by Detective Shirley.

Denied Prisoner's Tale. Shirley, who stated that Pohlman had asked him if the branch could be fixed up. Pohlman accused him of telling him to plead guilty to the charge, and he would get off light. Down denied this, saying he had never had a conversation with Pohlman. It was Down who took Pohlman back to London to answer the charge. Detective R. E. Grayson of London, corroborated Down's story regarding the arrest.

Crown Attorney McKillop and London's police magistrate, A. O. Graydon, were also called as witnesses. The magistrate said that Pohlman, when arrested, pleaded guilty to the charge, and when asked why he committed the crime could give no explanation.

Pohlman was tried in London, being sent up for trial by Magistrate Graydon. Judge Judd presided over the county court and dismissed it. The second charge against Pohlman was withdrawn. Following his arrest, Pohlman returned to Hamilton and started libel actions against the three Hamilton papers who published a story alleging pro-Germanism. Damages of \$100 were awarded against each of the three papers.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 22.—Remains of Mrs. Alfred H. Pococ, taken east on C.P.R. train this evening for burial in St. Peter's cemetery, London, Ont., will arrive here tomorrow morning at 3 p.m. Mr. and Mrs. Pococ, parents of widow, and the husband left Winnipeg.

ROSSER-DALE NUPTIALS.

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Canadians Will Be Part of Army To "Occupy" Germany

Soldier Cables His Address Will Be "85th, Germany."

HALIFAX, Nov. 22.—That the Canadians are to be part of the army of occupation in Germany, if they are not already there, is evident from a cable received today by A. B. Wiswell of this city from his son, Lieut. D. Wiswell, who is serving with the 85th Canadian reserve battalion in Branshott. The cable reads:

"This can have only one meaning, that this Nova Scotia Highland battalion is in Germany or is close to the border."

CLOVERDALE W. F. O. ELECTS OFFICERS

PARKHILL, Nov. 21.—The Cloverdale branch of the United Farmers held its annual meeting at the brick school north of town Tuesday evening. The school was packed with members and guests. Emory, president of the club occupied the chair.

The following officers were re-elected: President, Sidney Emory; vice-president, George Carson; secretary-treasurer, Earl Ritchie; directors, Albert Taylor, Lloyd Baker, David Mitchell, and William Davidson.

The president then read the minutes of the last meeting, and the secretary reported the financial statement. A motion was carried to adjourn until December 12, 1918.

ALLOTMENT TO VICTORY LOAN SUBSCRIPTIONS IS ENGAGING SIR THOMAS

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—The question of allotment to the Victory Loan is now engaging the attention of the department of finance. The policy will be to make the maximum subscription of stabilizing the market for Victory Loan securities, and to make the maximum subscription covering their revenue available for investment during the coming year.

There is a large and growing demand for farm loans which it is desirable should be met in the interests of agricultural production for next year. The province and municipalities will also desire to borrow for reconstruction purposes and it is thought advisable had here should be a maximum subscription funds to meet their needs. The principle of allotment will be decided within the next few days.

GOVERNMENT LABOR BUREAUS DISCUSSED FROM MANY ANGLES

Provincial Representatives Confer With Minister.

PLAN IS TAKING SHAPE

Aim Will Be To See That Labor Is Equally Distributed.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—Satisfactory progress towards the establishment of a national system of employment agencies, controlled by the Dominion and provincial authorities, working as a single organization, was made at the conference between the minister of labor, officials of the department, representatives of the various provinces, which was continued today.

The conclusion of the provincial representatives' conference at noon left Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, to preside at the conference of the provincial representatives from east and west of their hearty co-operation and desire to develop the scheme.

Two Clearing Houses. The plan was agreed upon with regard to the establishment of agencies, will result in the organization of two large employment clearing houses, controlled by the Federal Government, one in the east and one in the west. Ottawa and Winnipeg have been chosen as the cities in which these clearing houses will be located.

The duty of these agencies will be to maintain the balance of labor in the various provinces so that one province will not have a deficit at the time while another has a surplus. The provinces will also establish clearing houses, which will maintain the balance of labor in the various provinces for the purpose of distributing labor between the various provinces and towns of the country.

Representatives of the soldiers' civil service, and the National Association of Veterans' Association were present at the conference in the afternoon, and the plan was discussed in relation to unemployment.

HONOR FLAG PRESENTED AT AILSA CRAIG

AILSA CRAIG, Nov. 22.—Anniversary of the death of the late Thomas Ailsa Craig, who was killed at the battle of Vimy, was celebrated at the Ailsa Craig Club on Sunday, December 1, when Rev. Thos. Weir, M.A., Ph.D., principal of the Ailsa Craig School, presided at 11 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. Special singing by the choir will be a feature.

A meeting of citizens of the village in the town hall this week Rev. John Morgan presented Victory Loan Canada D. Robinson and John Alexander with the flag and crown offered for those who reach the objective allotted. The amount expected from here was \$35,000, and it was exceeded considerably.
