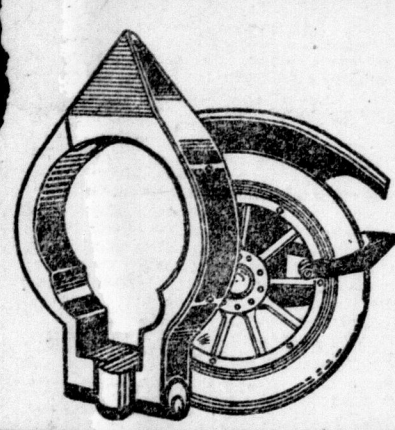

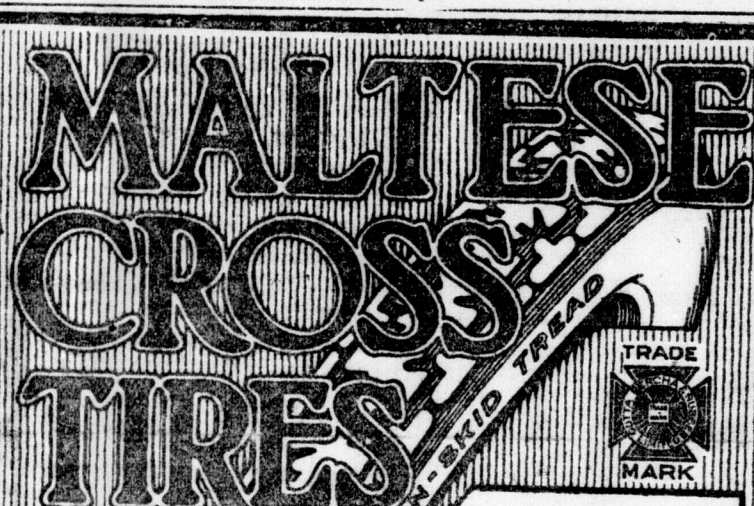

VON HOLLWEG ASKED POINTED QUESTIONS BY SUB-COMMITTEE

PARIS, Oct. 31.—Former Vice-Chancellor Bethman von Hollweg was a witness before the subcommittee of the national assembly investigating what had been the possibilities of war. He was asked several searching questions by the committee.

The committee requested answers from Dr. von Bethman Hollweg as to whether he was in the cabinet when the war began and held office until July 14, 1917, to the following three questions:

1. Why did the Central Powers make their peace offer December 15, 1918, when action by President Wilson for peace had been suggested by Germany and a certain prospect of mediation was held out at the last?

2. Why were concrete peace conditions not communicated to President Wilson?

3. Why, instead of pursuing the idea of action toward peace by President Wilson, did Germany assent to ruthless submarine warfare if she knew it would lead to war with the United States?

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CANVASSERS SELL \$145,000 WORTH OF BONDS ON FRIDAY

London Out To Win German Guns, Running Up Big Total

NEARING \$5,000,000 MARK

Teams Sell \$125,000 Worth of Bonds To 250 Applicants.

A splendid day's work, despite the disagreeable weather, was done yesterday by the Victory Loan canvassers in the city, when \$145,000 was added to the grand total of subscriptions made to date, making it \$4,855,500. The results of the team-work netted \$125,000 for 250 applications, while the special subscriptions amounted to \$20,000 for ten applications.

The Dominion headquarters advised the local authorities that the second captured German field guns of a large calibre have been secured through the archives department, and are now open for competition among the loan units of the province. Needless to state, London is already "hot" for the guns.

The message from Dominion headquarters states: "We believe that every unit in Ontario will be anxious to secure one of these guns, not only for the honor of the award, but also because they will stand as a mark of the local effort, public spirit and patriotism at a time when every community was called upon to do a great national service."

"One gun will be awarded to the unit attaining the highest percentage of the combined team members and special subscriptions objective."

"One will be awarded to the unit attaining the highest percentage of its members' objective."

"One cannot win two guns. In standing second the second team members' percentage."

"The Ontario executive will have a plate attached to each gun with a suitable inscription and the names of the executive committee of the winning unit."

Rev. Thomas M. Joplin, field secretary of the Shantymen's Christian Association, is back in London again on his annual visit. He will be in the city for about three weeks, and will speak in a number of churches on the work of his organization in the lumber camps throughout the Dominion. He represents an organization which extends from Atlantic to Pacific, and which carries the Gospel into 270 camps, where approximately 15,000 people are employed.

The work of the Shantymen's Christian Association has been extended to the more remote camps of British Columbia during the past year, and one of the objects of Mr. Joplin's visit is to raise funds with which to carry on the good work. He states that there are still thousands of men in the lumber camps who never heard of the Gospel, and that his organization represents hopes to reach scores of new camps before the spring of 1920.

The missionaries are carried to a good many camps on dog teams and sledges. They are often in the bush for weeks at a time, and the security of their conditions in the camps are much better than they were ten years ago. Every bunk house is now well lighted and bunks built in the old wooden are provided and each camp has a reading room for the men.

Checked Bolshevism. The missionaries have been able to successfully combat Bolshevism in the camps, according to Mr. Joplin. He says there is no Bolshevism among the foreign lumbermen, but that it has failed to spread to the native born lumbermen. With the present condition of the country, the secretary believes that the Shantymen's Association is undenominational.
