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HALCROW WILL HEAD LABORIES

Labor Group Will Not Press
For Eight-Hour Day or
Pensions.

TORONTO, Jan. 17.—George Grant Halcrow, M. P. for East Hamilton, consented today to accept the position of House leader of the Labor group in the Legislature, offered to him a short time ago at a conference here of the Labor M. P. P. and executive officers of the Independent Labor Party. Mr. Halcrow's leadership will not extend to the Labor members of the cabinet, but will be confined to the private members of the House. He presided at a conference of the Labor members of the Legislature here today, when matters in connection with labor legislation were considered.

Will Not Press. As a result of today's conference, it is understood that the Labor group will not press for eight-hour day legislation at the coming session, as they believe that a province-wide enforcement of the eight-hour day is not practicable at the present time. However, it is understood that the Labor group will present the question in this manner that the Government will take it under advisement with a view to possible future action thereon.

Neither will the group insist upon at the approaching session. Opinion seems to be divided among the labor members on the advisability of pressing for such legislation in the Provincial Legislature, some of them taking the ground that it is a matter for the Federal Government to deal with.

Favors Payment. While the labor group favors the payment of 100 per cent compensation for injuries to workmen, it is understood that the group will not make this a matter for contention at the coming session of the Legislature, as the members of the Government oppose it very strongly.

The labor conference, from which M. M. MacBride, M.P., Brantford, was conspicuously absent, was in the nature of a preliminary meeting to the caucus of U. F. O. and labor supporters of the Government to be held tomorrow.

Important Change Is Made in Connection With Schools. CHATHAM, Jan. 17.—The following amendment to gas order fifteen was issued today by Gas Commissioner E. S. Estlin: "The said order is hereby amended by adding to the clause which reads as follows: 'Schools and halls used for school purposes' the following words: 'Whereas gas is the sole fuel used for heating subject to the minimum consumption in any room of seventy-five thousand cubic feet.'"

PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO STEALING VEHICLE. MADISON, Wis., Jan. 17.—Pierre P. Author, who two weeks ago eloped with the wife of Philip Franzen of Madison, pleaded not guilty to a charge of grand larceny preferred by Franzen when arraigned in superior court here today, and was returned to jail when he was unable to furnish \$1,000 bail. Preliminary hearing was set for Thursday.

Franzen charged he was forced to give Author \$100 to defray "honeymoon" expenses. Neither Franzen nor his wife was present at the hearing. Author was brought here Sunday, following his arrest in Chicago. His wife served in the Canadian army medical corps as a nurse, and is a former resident of Montreal.

Nebula Breaks Speed Records

Is Now Dashing Through
Space At 1,224 Miles a
Second.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 17.—(Canadian Press.)—Nebula Dreyer, No. 584 in the constellation of Cetus, has broken all known speed records of the heavens. It is dashing through space away from the earth at a velocity of almost 2,000 kilometres a second, the highest speed ever attained by a celestial object. This was the word received at the Harvard College observatory today from Dr. V. M. Slipher of the Lowell Observatory, Flagstaff, Arizona, in announcing to the result of spectrographic observations there.

Prof. Solon I. Bailey of the Harvard University Observatory said most of the stars move through the heavens at less than 100 kilometres a second; gain a momentum of a few hundred kilometres a second, and other objects, such as the comet of 1910, move at a speed of only 1,130 kilometres a second. The Harvard scientist said, Sun, star or nebula has never been known to move faster than Dreyer, No. 584, in his opinion.

The nebula, which is so faint that it is not visible to the eye, is in the lower southern sky in the early evening.

LOSS \$40,000 IN SARNIA FIRE. Big Lake Boats in Danger When Ice Houses Burn. SARNIA, Jan. 17.—Fire of an unknown origin tonight totally destroyed a three-hour-old building on the bank of the St. Clair River, causing a loss of \$40,000, and for a time threatened a tribunal of the city.

RECOMMEND NEW POLICE STATION. GUELPH, Jan. 17.—At the organization meeting of the Police Commission today, Judge Hayes was re-elected chairman, and the members are: Magistrate Watt, who was re-elected clerk, and Mayor Burgess. The commission also considered the question of increasing the local police force. Chief Rae is asking for three more men, and a deputation of tax drivers waited on the commission and asked for amendments to the present police regulations. The claim is complicated. They ask that the city be divided into districts.

SUGGEST PROVIDING MEALS. WINDSOR, Jan. 17.—While the situation in the Border Cities is by no means as serious as it was some time ago, Dr. L. Hyttenrauch, medical director of the border cities, has recommended that the board of education consider the feasibility of providing light refreshments for the children of the border cities. Dr. Hyttenrauch declared, but he believed that the board of education will do better school work as a result.

TURKS CLAIM GREEK DEFEAT. Nationalist Press Say Turks Won Pitched Battle At Eskishehr. CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 17.—The defeat of the Greek forces by the Turkish nationalists in a pitched battle near Eskishehr, the junction of the Baghdad line with the railroad to Ankara, is claimed by the nationalist press at Ankara. The nationalist capital. The engagement occurred at Inonu, 13 miles west of Eskishehr.

The Greeks, who had made considerable advances since the beginning of their offensive some days ago, are now reported from Ankara to be withdrawing along the entire front. The nationalist press is reported to have captured Bleik, 35 miles northwest of Eskishehr, making 600 prisoners and capturing six guns and much material. The Greeks are said to be abandoning the line.

The above reports are considered here to be exaggerated, as the Greeks have not been able to hold the line for the same length of time in victory for their arms.

U. F. O. LEADERS ARE FIRMLY OPPOSED TO PREMIER'S ATTITUDE

Burnaby Believes Drury Going
Contrary to Electors' Wishes.

TORONTO, Jan. 17.—Premier E. C. Drury's speech at Milton last week, in which he said he believed that the United Farmers' organization, as an organization, should not go into politics, has aroused strong opposition from leaders in the United Farmers' party of Ontario, notably R. W. E. Burnaby, president of the U. F. O., and J. L. Morrison, U. F. O. secretary. Mr. Burnaby is not only head of the United Farmers' party in Ontario, but is president of the council of agriculture, whose headquarters are in Western Canada. President Burnaby is quoted in part in an interview here tonight as follows:

"On account of Premier Drury's position his statements regarding people's party, etc., are undoubtedly misinterpreted by the masses of the people generally. He has no right to, and cannot, speak for the U. F. O. because the organization has always been the very opposite view of his. He is not giving his own personal opinion. The very foundation of the U. F. O. is democracy, which means if it means anything, the will of the majority. The U. F. O. in convention has made in the constitution, but no suggestion whatever was made to provide for opening the membership to other than those directly interested in farming."

Platform Is Broad. "The prime minister has frequently stated, and we agree with him, that our platform is big enough, broad enough, and strong enough, to hold all classes of people of irrespective of their calling, but the matter of admitting all and sundry into our ranks is another question."

"Almost daily we have instances of men trying to get into the U. F. O. organization with the hope of becoming candidates for Parliament for selfish reasons only, and some with no apparent object but to split up the whole movement."

"I am at a loss to understand Mr. Drury's attitude in this matter. It would appear as though he had been suddenly influenced by the politicians, and that he has changed his mind. I am sure, however, that he will not give up his position as president of the U. F. O., and the steady return to the old two-party system."

"In my opinion, by so doing, he is going contrary to the wishes of the people who elected his government, as well as to the large organization which is responsible for his government being in power today."

Morrison's Statement. Secretary J. J. Morrison made the following statement: "The position of the U. F. O. I believe to be quite clear. We are the country's government; that government must be a government for the people, and it will be made so. If approved by the people, but if it is not, we will not support it. I am sure, however, that he will not give up his position as president of the U. F. O., and the steady return to the old two-party system."

"I should be remembered that the power of saying that the organization will or will not do tests with the delegates in general convention assembled. Their struggle to establish democracy in their organization is a reflection of what they would establish in government. Sir Thomas White has said that the war would have to be paid from the top six inches of the soil. Are not those who till the soil to have any say in how it shall be done?"
